

## FOURTEENTH WARD IS REORGANIZED

Proposed to Make it Center of  
Special Missionary Work for  
Business Section.

ELIAS S. WOODRUFF BISHOP.

Is Called Together With Elders George  
Q. Morris and Quayle Cannon  
As His Counselors.

A reorganization of the Fourteenth ward was effected last evening, with the calling of Elder Elias S. Woodruff as bishop, Elders George Q. Morris and Quayle Cannon, being chosen first and second counselors, respectively. All are young men, formerly residents of that ward, but of late had been living elsewhere, and the fact of their being selected under the circumstances of non-residence marks rather an innovation.

The Fourteenth ward is, or will be when the Thirteenth ward makes a contemplated move of chapel, the only ecclesiastical subdivision having a meetinghouse in the very heart of the city. It is intended to remodel the Fourteenth ward assembly hall, make it strictly up to date in every particular and commence therein a special missionary work commensurate with its favored position. Endeavors will be made to attract thither people who sojourn for a short time in the city, as well as the numbers of young men and women who, for the lack of permanent homes, reside at hotels and rooming houses.

### ZEALOUS WORKERS.

The new bishopric is composed of zealous and efficient Church workers, and to their aid in the proposed missionary work will be called at least ten men and five women to act as a board. These 15 persons may be actual residents of other wards, but will be completely identified, in membership and otherwise, with the Fourteenth ward.

Bishop Woodruff was born in Randolph, Rich county, Dec. 15, 1873. His father is Clifford Woodruff, Jr., and he is a grandson of the late President Wilford Woodruff. The name of his mother is Emily Jane Smith Woodruff.

eldest daughter of the late Judge Elias A. Smith. From the time he was two and a half years old to his 13th year, Elias S. Woodruff resided in the Fourteenth ward, and there he was baptized and later ordained a deacon. He performed a mission to Kentucky a few years ago, and after his return home was very active in the Seventeenth ward and the Salt Lake stake. He was assistant superintendent of the Sunday school, a member of the High Council, and stake supervisor of parents' classes.

### HIS COUNSELORS.

George Q. Morris is a son of the late Bishop Elias Morris, and was born in that portion of the old Fifteenth ward which is now included in the Fourteenth ward. Prior to the present call he was stake superintendent of the Salt Lake stake Y. M. M. I. A., and a president of the Third quorum of seventy.

Quayle Cannon is a son of Patriarch Angus M. Cannon, and of late has resided in Pioneer stake. There he was president of an elder's quorum and superintendent of the Cannon ward Sunday school. The choice made in the selection of the new bishopric meets with the unqualified approval of the members of the Fourteenth ward, and the action is commended by all who have the acquaintance of the young men called to such important positions.

### PHOTOGRAPHED IN COLORS.

J. Leo. Hafen of Provo Takes First Picture in Utah.

The first photograph to be taken in natural colors in Utah, was made last week by J. Leo Hafen of Provo. The process is known as the Lumiere French process, the feature of which is the exclusion of the red rays in the natural light from the camera by means of a specially prepared screen and a peculiar treatment of the plate itself. Mr. Hafen brought the first

photograph on glass to the "News" office. It represents the inside of a Provo greenhouse, showing geraniums, lilacs, ferns, hyacinths, daffodils, hubber plants, callas, etc., all in their natural colors. ## SALVATION WAS SPEAKER'S THEME

Elder D. O. McKay Discourses  
Upon Comparative Value  
Of Two Kinds.

### SPIRITUAL OVER TEMPORAL

Large Tabernacle Congregation Closely Follow His Remarks to the Close—All May Be Redeemed.

Salvation, temporal and spiritual, and the comparative value and importance of the latter over the former, was the subject of an interesting discourse by Elder David O. McKay, of the council of the apostles, at the tabernacle yesterday afternoon. A large congregation was in attendance, and the speaker was closely followed throughout his remarks.

The selections by the choir were, "All hail the glorious day," "Hark, listen to the trumpeters," and the "Hallelujah" chorus, the last named being more than usually well rendered. Elder Rodney C. Badger offered the invocation and Elder Joseph E. Taylor pronounced the benediction. The services were presided over by President John R. Winder.

Elder McKay, quoted the third article of faith, "We believe that through the Atonement of Christ, all mankind may be saved by obedience to the laws and ordinances of the gospel." Salvation is the boon for which every man in the world is seeking. Though all men desire salvation many different ways are adopted to obtain it. In physical life, even among plants, there is a struggle for existence and against the elements of the world. The same desire to prolong life, and each species is daily in constant danger from other forms of life.

Man responds to the requirements of environment surrounding and seeks salvation physically. Salvation means deliverance or preservation from destruction. Intelligence that believes in a higher life than that of mortality should be most concerned in salvation of the soul. In a religious sense salvation means deliverance from sin and the bestowal of everlasting life. Man is grogging after temporal salvation, often times at the neglect of his soul's redemption; his aim being no higher than that of the brute world.

### ALL MAY BE REDEEMED.

All men may be redeemed from spiritual death. To die is but to fall to respond to environment. In the present state man lives in a sinless, but in a necessarily unprogressive state, having no opposite conditions whereby he might appreciate the environment in which he lived. Therefore the second or mortal estate became necessary to man's eternal welfare, according to the plans and decrees of his Creator.

With temporal death came a decree imposing spiritual death, and men were left as subjects following their own will little above the brute creation, carnal, selfish and devilish by nature. But this state seems to have been necessary for man's eternal happiness. From this condition it was expedient that he be redeemed, but the power of self-redemption was not his. Here comes the application of the scripture "By grace are ye saved." EARTH A PROBATIONARY STATE.

to man is given to make use of the earth and things earthly to enable him to regain that which he lost in coming here; mortality is a means to immortality, a stepping-stone to something higher.

The principles that open the door into the kingdom are faith, repentance, baptism and the laying on of hands for the gift of the Holy Ghost. After these the Christ Spirit that leads to perfection.

### HOBEN CONVICTED.

Found Guilty by Jury After Somewhat Sensational Trial.

Martin F. Hoben, of Bingham, was late Saturday afternoon convicted by a jury of a statutory offense. The verdict was rendered after an hour's deliberation by the foreman and after a trial of several days' duration, in which the proceedings at times bordered on the sensational.

The complaining witness, Miss Edna Thomas, and her mother, both of Bingham, admitted that they had testified falsely at the preliminary hearing, as to the girl's age. But there was much testimony to the effect that Hoben's wrongdoing began prior to the circumstances upon which the complaint was founded, and at a time when Miss Thomas was actually under the age of consent, 18 years.

During the trial of the case, the defense accused Dist. Atty. Leofbourne of having wrongfully opened a certain package of affidavits, but that official went upon the stand and testified that his actions were sanctioned by an order from the court. Atty. A. B. Eder had advised her to testify her age, an accusation that Mr. Eder stoutly denied.

The defendant was instructed to appear in court at 10 o'clock on Monday, and the bond of \$500 was kept in force. His attorneys state that a new trial will be asked for, and if the request is denied, the case will go to the supreme court.

President Jordan of Stanford Writes Letter About Their Relationship.

How President David Starr Jordan of Stanford university views the present situation in college athletics, and what he considers the underlying causes, is well illustrated in a letter received from him by a friend in Salt Lake.

It deals with the domination of the athletic interests of certain small universities over the faculty and regents, and says that "college presidents who think that athletics can be used in advertising are likely to be led off their base and the smaller college and the more eager for advertising, the smaller the men likely to be at the head of it."

"The case of football under a professional coach is in every institution just as bad as the public opinion of the institution will let it be, and of course it is very natural that where professional promoters run the athletic interests of a college the professional fans will get in touch with them."

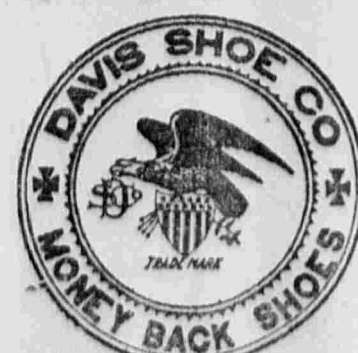
