**Courses and the Mexican Revolution.**  
NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—There is no longer any doubt that Curtis' Army has opened a revolutionary war in Mexico. A messenger received here from the State Department says that the insurgents are now over fifteen thousand strong and were over fifteen thousand of them in the Mexican garrison. One Mexican soldier was killed and another wounded. The location of the latter side is not known. It is evident that the insurgents have been quietly increasing their forces and have now a force of over twenty thousand men. A dispatch from El Paso City says that the revolutionaries are well armed, and that they have many sympathizers among the Mexicans on this side of the border.

#### PORTER RETURNS.

**How That Part is Looked Upon by Politicians.**

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—A short newspaper arrived yesterday from New York containing news of the Mexican War. Porter received here this morning on the steamer "Normandie," and presented at once to the Washington, having been sent to him by his friends. He declined to talk, but his audience gives rise to the rumor that the Italian government thinks this an opportunity to increase its neutrality for the New Orleans affair, since the naval vessels are concentrating in Cuban waters and may be needed there some time.

#### A Shooting Affray.

HOLMES, Ark., Nov. 15.—A shooting affray occurred yesterday at Rocky Gap, between two men, William Clark, an engineer and Thomas Lovin, a blacksmith. The men quarreled about an old trouble, and Lovin fired a shot at Clark, hitting him in the head and killing Clark down. The latter fell unconscious and, thinking him dead, Lovin gave up his gun. Clark recovered consciousness, and, when he awoke, found Lovin gone. Getting up, he shot one of which took effect, causing death. Clark then lost consciousness again and may die.

#### A Plan to Rob a Train Arrested.

LOUIS, Nov. 15.—An attempt to rob the Missouri, Kansas & Texas road train to and from St. Louis was discovered by the officials last night. A telegram was sent to Memphis, notifying the officers that the robbers were seen in the vicinity. A extra was sent to the station, but no robbers placed in the postal and express cars. It is believed that one or two of the gang got on the train at Memphis and signaled the drivers not to stop, so that the train was guaranteed. The officers have been put on the trail of the robbers.

#### A Cleveland Raid.

CLEVELAND, Nov. 15.—One of the most interesting days Cleveland has had took place at 5 o'clock yesterday, and before extinguished at midnight it had destroyed \$200,000 worth of property and caused the serious injury of two others. The fire started in the big job printing establishment of Short & Johnson, fronting on Euclid Avenue, stretching back to Franklin street. The building is in the heart of the downtown business and banking center, and surrounded by high brick blocks. The fire spread rapidly to the four buildings adjoining, and all were soon enveloped in flames. The Johnson House, a three-story brick building fronting on Superior Avenue, was the next in the path of the fire.

The flames played over and around its roof. The guards made a hasty call, and all the firemen were soon on hand. The fire would be destroyed, together with the Weddell House, which adjoins it on the east. A general call for steamers was made, and ten vapors were soon on the scene. The first steamer to arrive was No. 1, and Captain John Gray and Captain Michael Hawley and Charles Ward of the same company carried the men from the burning building, and the remaining steamers followed. The flames spread rapidly, engulfing the four buildings, and, surrounded by high brick blocks, the fire spread rapidly to the four buildings adjoining, and all were soon enveloped in flames. #### Dan Plat's Funeral.

#### BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

St. Louis, Nov. 14.—A special in the "Examiner" from San Antonio, Tex., says: News has just reached here that Captain James D. Hart, of the 1st U.S. Cavalry, was killed at the head of his band, attacked the Indians at Glorieta, New Mex., and was reported with loss of life. No formal notice has been given.

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Nov. 14.—The stage which runs between this city and Plymouth, Amador county, was held up last Tuesday by highwaymen. The driver was shot through the head, and the stage was left to burn. The robbery was committed with great boldness, but they committed nothing. The highwaymen robbed the driver of his cash (\$1).

MILFORD, Pa., Nov. 14.—There is a general alarm throughout the country over the shooting of T. C. Davis, who was shot by a worthless fellow named Simon Finkle, while Davis was hunting and was in the act of shooting him. The fellow was also severely wounded and it is feared that the latter will die. The assailant was arrested.

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 14.—A fire last night destroyed the home of Mrs. Anna Morrison, a neighbor passing the place today observed the former occupied. Mrs. Morrison, who was well-known and lived alone, and the fact that she was in the city yesterday, and was not seen, probably leads to the theory that the fire was accidental. The number will increase.
