Board of Education Passes Resolutions Eulogizing its Late President.

SERIOUS CASE OF ASSAULT.

Ogden, Utah, July 15.—More tributes to the late Thomas D. Dee were paid last night at the meeting of the board of education. As soon as the session was called to order Vice President R. B. Joyce made official announcement of the death of the late president of the board, and in a short address referred to the important work which Judge Dee had performed for the city schools. Dr. Joyce spoke with much feeling and expressed himself as regretful that the loss of the school but to the members of the board personally.

REESE R. LEWELYN DEAD.

Handcuff Pioneer and Veteran Closes Grand Career at 77.

Fountain Green, Sanpete Co., July 13.—Reese R. Lewelyn of this place died on the morning of the 10th inst., and was buried yesterday. He had been in poor health for the last three years, and was nearly 77 years of age. He emigrated from Wales, in the early '50s; emigrated to Utah in 1856, went from Iowa City to Salt Lake City, 1,300 miles, pulling a hand cart, with his wife, having just been married. He took part in the John Canyon campaign in 1857, and settled in Fountain Green in 1859, and has lived here ever since. He was agent for the Deseret News for many years, and was the first postmaster here, and served as such for 25 years. He served one term in the Territorial Legislature in the early '80s. Was counselor to the Bishop here for about 10 years. Has served as town president, justice of the peace, and in nearly every civil capacity here, being highly respected by the people. He leaves, besides his wife, four sons and three daughters, and a large number of grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

The speakers at the funeral services were Lewis Anderson, president of the South Sanpete stake, Bishop Davis of county ward, Nathaniel Edmunds and Henry D. Rees of Wales, who were companions of his youth and who also came to this country with him, pulling their hand carts with the same company. A. J. Angard, Jr., also spoke at the funeral services, about 40 vehicles followed the remains to the cemetery.

The blow was struck in the heat of passion, but it may deprive Kallik of his liberty for some time.

FOR NEW SCHOOL BUILDING.

At the school election held yesterday William Ogden was elected by a unanimous vote to succeed himself as a member of the school board. The proposition of bonding the district for \$20,000 for the purpose of erecting a new school building was also submitted to the electors. There was no opposition to the proposition in the matter as all seemed to be in favor of the proposition. The vote resulted 45 for and 1 against the proposed bond issue. The bonds will be available in the near future for the erection of the building next spring. The same to be completed in time for occupancy in a year from now. The building will be constructed of pressed brick and to contain 12 rooms. It will be a two-story high, the second floor to be occupied by the High school.

CHILD SCALDED TO DEATH.
