LONDON, 10.—An immense meet-

ing on the eastern question was

held at Guildhall to-day, over

the proceedings were presided

by the Earl of Derby. The

pressing indignation in the govern-

ment was rejected by an over-

whelming majority. A motion in

favor of the immediate convoca-

tion of Parliament was carried. The

crowd was so great that the vast

number of delegates were unable

to get into Guildhall, and

another meeting was held out-

side the building.
