Editors Deseret News:

In your issue of 29th ult., you referred to the experience of some one in regard to the growth of dodder in lucern, and asked for the experience of others.

I sent to Kaysville for seed in 1875 and sowed a patch which came up well, but in a little time I discovered that the little vine was getting a start, and although I had a plenty of water the dodder almost destroyed the lucern, and I was afraid my labor would be lost, but the next season it grew very fine.

I had other lots sown in 1876 and 1877 which did well, except this spring a few small patches were to be seen.

Last season I had a plenty of water, and this year the water was quite limited.
