[Continued from Page 5.] The reformation has touched the hearts of both men and women. The people generally are turning round, and they will serve God more perfectly than hitherto. Many of you have never tried this order until now, and let me tell you brethren, that it is necessary for you to keep the Holy Ghost. If you have not got it, you must get it and never be without it. You must shed forth that influence on your family, as brs. Joseph and Heber told you this morning, or they will leave you. They will not stay with a man who is destitute of it, it they are good women, neither should they. This is a word for you, my brethren, who are now starting out on this principle. It is a good, virtuous, and holy principle, and not to be trifled with. The women as a general thing have power and faith in this kingdom, and they come into this order with full purpose of heart, desiring to do right; and in leading them if you will be careful of your own feelings, and have a little magnanimity of mind, it will be better for you and they will stick to you, because it is for their salvation in the kingdom of our God.
