WASHINGTON, D. C., 23 .- Adjutant General Drum to-day received the fol lowing telegram from General Miles dated July 22nd: Captain Lawton re ports through Col. Royal, commanding at Fort Huachuca, that his com mand surprised Geronimo's camp of Yonge river, about 130 miles south and east of Campos, Souora, or nearly 300 miles south of the Mexican boundary capturing all the Indian propert including hundreds of pounds of dried meat and nineteen riding animals. This is the fifth time within three Co-operative Mercantile Institution months in which the Indians have been surprised by troops. While the re-sults have not been declsive, yet it has given encouragement to the troops them a feeling of insecurity in the re mote and almost inaccessible moun tains of Mexico.
