In Birth Record Males In the Lead by Six.

In the birth record for the week the males load the females by six in a total of 32. Of 12 death reported during the week, there were soven males and five females, five being shipped for burial.

The weekly report of the board of health for the week ending Aug. 14, shows a total of 17 cases of conta-

gious and infectious diseases, con-sisting of three cases of dipheria; five cases of whooping cough; eight cases of typhoid fever and one case of tuberculesis. Two houses account of smallpox; six houses account of scariet fever and three houses account of diphfever and three houses account of scarlet theria, remain in quarantine at the ending of the week.
