

Department, yesterday, states that the Spanish Cabinet has decided to carry out the protocol by proceeding to try Burriell and the other officers who murdered the *Virginus* prisoners.

BALTIMORE, 1.—The stockholders of the Baltimore and Southern Steam Transit Co. have resolved to turn over the property to the directors for the benefit of the creditors; the indebtedness is said to be \$120,000. The steamers will be run as usual.

The meeting to express popular condemnation of the manner in which the election in this city, on Nov. 2nd, was conducted, was held last night, and was numerously attended; resolutions were passed denouncing the conduct of the police commissioners and the appointment of an executive committee to contest several elections.

NEW ORLEANS, 1.—The Bank of America has suspended. The board of directors resolved to cease active operations and put the bank into liquidation at once.

NEW YORK, 1.—News was received yesterday in Washington, of the death, in China, of the Hon. Benjamin P. Avery, the American Minister to that country, appointed about two years ago to succeed Minister Low.

A London dispatch states that the wife of Hon. Hugh Childers was found dead in her bed at her husband's residence yesterday morning. A bottle containing chloroform was found beside her.

Judge Barrett has sent John Scannell, acquitted of murder, and Thomas Donahoe, on ground of insanity, to the Utica Asylum.

WASHINGTON, 1.—The State Department has information that Mr. Avery, minister to China, died at Peking on the 8th of November, but no particulars.

The commissioners of the District of Columbia have brought suit against ex-Treasurer James A. Magruder, of the board of public works, and his sureties, claiming \$50,000 damages. The declaration sets forth that \$14,647,402 was received and in part disbursed by Magruder, but he refused to render an account as required. The case will not go on the trial calendar until the February term, and it is not probable it will be tried until the Fall of 1876.

The report of the superintendent of public printing shows that the total cost of printing, binding, lithographing, &c., for the government for the year ending Sept. 30 last, was \$1,500,425. The Congressional Record cost \$88,959 additional. Nearly all the printing ordered by the last Congress is completed. There are now 1,200 employees in all the departments, with a pay roll of \$95,000 a month. The compositors get sixty cents per one thousand ems, or four dollars a day for eight hours.

The debt statement shows a decrease during November of \$480,078, coin balance \$70,404,676, currency balance \$12,014,962, special deposit for redemption of certificates of deposit \$42,610,000.

Gen. Babcock this morning received a telegram from District Attorney Dyer, at St. Louis, in answer to one sent by him yesterday, demanding a hearing before the court, stating that the very case had been closed and the next case, involving the question of conspiracy, was set for the 15th of December.

HYDE PARK, N. Y., 1.—Captain Woolcott, of the steamer *Sunnyside* from Albany, reports his vessel cut in two by ice at two o'clock this morning. He ran her ashore, but she broke in two, slipped into deep water and sank. He reports eleven persons drowned, six of whom were waiters and chambermaids on the boat, the remainder passengers. The steamer is sunk to the hurricane deck and the ice is cutting her upper works away rapidly. For two hours fifty or sixty persons were hanging to the rods and mast of the promenade deck before they could be got off.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., 1.—A fire broke out at 1 o'clock this morning in the round house of the Indianapolis, Bloomington and Western Railroad. There were eight engines in the house at the time. All were badly burned before the fire engines arrived. Loss on the engines is estimated at \$40,000 to \$50,000, and on the building \$15,000 to \$20,000.

MILWAUKEE, 1.—Schlitz and Bergenthal, rectifiers, convicted of shipping goods without entering the same as required by law, were this morning sentenced to a fine of \$1,000 each and four months imprisonment in the county jail.

NATICK, Mass., 1.—To-day the closing rites over the remains of Vice President Wilson took place and notwithstanding the severe cold weather there was a large attendance. At four p.m. yesterday the coffin was carried from the public hall where the face had been exposed to view to his late residence, and where his mother-in-law now resides. At twelve o'clock the exercises began. The choir of Mr. Wilson's church sang a hymn, followed by the reading of the Scriptures, and prayer and an address by Rev. Mr. Reynolds of Natick.

NEW YORK, 1.—Freeman D. Marckwalk, passenger on the White Star Co's steamer *Atlantic*, wrecked on Morse Island, Nova Scotia, two years ago on the voyage from Liverpool to New York, sued for \$5,000 for the loss of his trunk, detention, &c., and obtained this evening in the supreme court a verdict for \$2,100.

The grand jury in the court of general sessions to-day made a presentment to Recorder Hackett, declaring that all games of chance had a demoralizing influence on the people, calling for the suppression of pool selling on horse races, regattas, elections, &c., as an evil which should be stopped, and stating that laws should be enacted or attempted to procure the punishment of offenders in these cases.

According to cable dispatches received from London by prominent Spaniards here, the reconstruction of the Spanish cabinet implies the appointment of General Jovellar to relieve General Valmaseda from command of the island of Cuba.

Private advices assert that the Cuban General De Janginita has slain a force of 300 men under Col. Campbell at the intersection of the main turnpike, running through the island and the road leading to Hemedios. A decoying force of sharpshooters was deployed to lead them in ambush, where they were attacked by the main body of the rebels.

The failure of John Thompson & Co., is announced.

The most interesting export feature of late has been an important shipment of ribbons to England.
