New York, May 12.—The market
showed weakness at the opening today,
but losses were restricted to fractions,
except in a few specialties. Concentrated
support was evident in the railroad lot
where prices were advanced in face
of heavy inflation. The specialties,
Continental tobacco preferred mainly
a seasonal drop of 6¢ points. The
bears began to cover in the specialties,
and sugar recovered 1¢ after a decline of
1¢. American tobacco 3¢ and Continental
tobacco preferred 4¢ points. The
market declined in stocks little in price
below the previous low level in the
month.

Lead stocks were freely offered
and lost a point in many cases.
The expected heavy increase in loans
failed to show in the bank statement,
and an effort was made to rally the
