



The first matter considered was a resolution from the Planters' associa ion, recommending the convention to accept the amendment, with a proviso that the United States government should make a reduction of 50 per cent on Cuban exports, or make a preference in their favor over similar products from other countries. The resolution was tabled without discussion.

The majority report of the committee on foreign relations, signed by Senors Gomez, Silva and Villuendas, was read, but after a discussion showed that a majority of the dele gates were opposed to it, a resolution to lay it on the table was carried. similar disposition was made of the reports from Senors De Quesda, Tama-yao, Nunez and Giberga.


