SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 25.—Chaffee, from

the committee on public lands, re-

ported a substitute for the Senate

bill authorizing the sale of the

public lands in the Territory of

Colorado, Nevada and the territory

to fall and remove timber on the

public domain for mining and

domestic purposes. Placed on the

calendar.

The Senate bill authorizing the

Washington and St. Paul Rail-

road Company to extend its road

into the Territory of Dakota, was

reported and discussed and passed.

Consideration was then resumed

of unfinished business, the long

bond bill.

Blaine moved that the interest
