Chicago, March 19,-The formation of a new political party-with the 1,500,-000 railroad employes of the country Ba a "inneleus"-to combat restrictive railroad legislation both in the national Congress and in the state legislatures, was advocated by John H. The 200,000 idle railroad men of the coun-try would listen eagerly to a proposi-tion to organize a great political party and the 700,000 railroad men still work-ing are ready to listen to any plan to ruarantee means of livelhood to them-selves and their brothers and to re-turn prosperity. In 1896 they stood together solidly, when the cause was not so great, and they can and will do it again. do it again.

San, Francisco, March 18 .- One year's Edward Burke, a New York jewel buyr, got for a theft of pearls and diaonds that aggregated \$165,000, for he was brought to book last night when a city detective placed a detaining hand on his shoulder as he walked out of a McAllister street saloon. The prisoner at first denied his identity, but when taken to headquarters and confronted with his photograph, admitted he was the main for whom the Pinkertons were searching.

Many magnificent pearls were being imported for the Chinese government, and Burke managed to make away with §50,000 of these in addition to other pearls and diamonds, the value of which amounted to \$165,000. He disappeared last May, and as soon as his absence was noted an investigation was begun, which disclosed the astonishing total of his stealings. Circulars were immedi-ately issued, and substantial rewards offered for his apprehension. WAS AEOUT TO SAIL.

WAS ABOUT TO SAIL. One of these circulars reached the local police, and it was on the strength of the portrait there depicted that Burke's arrest was made. The pris-oner violently protested when told that he was in custody, but admitted later that his name was Burke and that he was a fugitive from New York. Since his flight he has journeyed widely and has been to China, having returned from the Orient recently. It was his intention to go back to the far east on the next steamer when arrested. LA FOLLETTE SPUKE KUT Chicago, March 18.—James B., For-gan, president of the First National bank of Chicago, and chairman of the currency committee of the Bankers' as-sociation, in an interview today rela-tive to the speech of United States Senator La Follette of Wisconsin in the senate yesterday, said that the sen-ator was false in his assertions and a panderer to class prejudice. The speech was rot." said Mr. For-gan. "It is worse than rot. It is a de-liberate stirring up of passion and rage among people who have no facilities for acquiring knowledge at first hand and are dependent upon men whom they trust. This trust Senator La Fol-lette has betrayed. He has taken ad-vantage of his high office to use the confidence which his position lends to his words for the sake of abousing un-reasoning prejudice among people who have a right to know the truth from him. The entire import of his speech is absclutely false. I have never heard so much utterly sensational and untrue verblage quoted as coming from the lips of any one man."

Albany, N. Y., March 18 .- In the legfreedom with wealth was all that J. Islature today Senator Martin Saxe of New York introduced a concurrent resolution providing for a legislative investigation of the conduct of the office of the attorney-general of the state during the administration of the pres ent incumbent, William Schuyler Jackent incumbent, witham Schivler Jack-son of Buffalo, especially with refer-ence to receiverships of tanks and trust companies. Mr. Jackson was elected on the Democratic-Indepen-dence League ticket in November, 1906, and has been in office since Jan. 1, 1907. The general impression about the capitol tonight is that the resolution will be adopted and the investigation will be instituted.

THE CHARGES MADE.

The essential paragraph of the reso-lution recites that during the recent panic a large number of financial in-stitutions in New York City were com-pelled to suspend, and that it has since been widely charged that the office of the attorney general has been used by Mr. Jackson and his subordinates and assistants to provent communition of

Mr. Jackson and his subordinates and assistants to prevent resumption of solvent banks and trust companies; that he has procured the appointment of political adherents as receivers of such institutions, and that by "corrupt practises in the attorney general's of-fice the present financial depression and distress have been prolonged." Senator Saxe said today that he in-troduced the resolution at the instance of certain bankers in New York City whose names he might give later; but that it represented his own views. Atty.-Gen. Jackson said tonight that he would welcome an investigation of his office conducted in an impartial manner, without personal feeling or any consideration of polities.

#### TROUBLE OVER WOMAN STARTS SHOOTING AFFRAY

Prescott, Ariz, March 18.—A mes-sage from Harrington, about 50 miles south of here, says: Bruce Sarten is killed, and William Wheeler and Dave Alexander are wounded and under arrest, a the result of a shoting affray early this morning. Wheler and Alexander were visiting a woman last night whon Sarten called at the house and demanded entrance, which was refused. He then fired through the door with a shotgun, wounding Alexander in both hands. Alexander returned the fire with a pis-tol slightly wounding Sarten, who de-parted. He later returned and met the men as they were leaving the house. Sarten opened fire, wounding Wheeler, who returned the fire, shooting Sarten through the chest, the bullet coming out of the back, killing him almost in-stantly.

### PARISIAN COURT STIRRED WHEN LABORI TALKED

Paris. March 18.—Maitre Labori to-day presented to the court the side of the husband in the divorce suit brought in this city from Mrs. A. Hart McKee against Mr. McKee. The first hearing of the case took place March 4, when Mrs. McKee, through her counsel, de-scribed certain alleged indignities to which she had been subjected by her husband. Today Maitre Labori made counter charges of a most scandalous character against the wife, and de-clared that if the court granted a di-vorce it should pronounce in favor of the defendant and not in favor of the plaintiff. She was the witdow of Hugh Tevis at the time of her marriage to Mr. McKee in Phila-delphia in January, 1905. Maltre La-bori declared that Mr. McKee married Mrs. Tevis to save her honor. He men-tioned also an Italian marquis as a co-respondent. spondent

The allegations of Mr. McKee's cruel-ty to his wife and child and the flagrant wrongdoing were denied and then, in support of the contention that Mr. McKee should receive the decree of divorce, Maitre Labori proceeded to describe Mrs. McKee's alleged career while she was still Mrs. Tevis. He coupled her name with that of Lord Roslyn, and declared that she and Mr. McKee were living together at a hotel two days after they met. Continuing, counsel for the husband declared that his client had paid Mrs. McKee's bill, amounting to \$16,000, while she was in the south of Europe, and to disprove the charge of parsimony against him he declared that during a single night McKee had spent \$320 on flowers for his wife.
