

## PARTY TO STAND FOR RAILROADS

Suggested by Counsel Clarke of Nickel Plate in Banquet Talk.

SAYS TIME IS WHOLLY RIPE.

Figures One Million Voters Would Half Proposition to Kill Hostile Legislation, With Delight.

Chicago, March 18.—The formation of a new political party—with the 1,500,000 railroad employees of the country as a nucleus—to combat restrictive railroad legislation both in the national Congress and in the state legislatures, was advocated by John H. Clarke, counsel for the Nickel Plate system, at the annual banquet of the American Railway Engineering association last night.

“Every industry in the country except the greatest of all, agriculture, is organized to protect its capital, which is invested in it and the investors,” said Mr. Clarke. “It should be the same with the railroads. It should be an easy matter to organize the railroad, and there never was a more opportune time to attempt it. The 200,000 idle railroad men of the country would listen eagerly to a proposition to organize a great political party and the 700,000 railroad men still working are ready to listen to any plan to guarantee means of livelihood to themselves and their families and to return prosperity. In 1896 they stood together solidly, when the cause was not so great, and they can and will do it again.”

“Only one man can stop the anti-railroad legislation that prevails, and he is the voter. I believe we should organize a great political party, and a great leader will arise who can effect such a great organization when the call is sounded.”

## FLEW QUOTE HIGH ON SPOKEN MONEY

J. Edward Burke Arrested by San Francisco Detective for New York Crime.

San Francisco, March 18.—One year's freedom with wealth was all that J. Edward Burke, a New York jewel buyer, got for a theft of pearls and diamonds that aggregated \$185,000, for he was brought to book last night when a city detective placed a detaining hand on his shoulder as he walked out of a McAlister street saloon. The prisoner at first denied his identity, but when taken to headquarters and confronted with his photograph admitted he was the man for whom the Pinkertons were searching.

HAD ACCESS TO GEMS.  
Burke had desk room in the office of Marcellus & Pitt on Broadway, New York, and had access to the stock of gems which this large house handled. Many magnificent pearls were being imported for the Chinese government, and Burke managed to make away with \$50,000 of these in addition to other pearls and diamonds, the value of which amounted to \$135,000. He disappeared last May, and as soon as his absence was noted an investigation was begun, which disclosed the astonishing truth of his stealing. Circulars were immediately sent out, and substantial rewards offered for his apprehension.

WAS ABOUT TO FLEE.  
One of these circulars reached the local police and it was on the strength of the portrait there depicted that Burke's arrest was made. The prisoner violently protested when told that he was in custody, but admitted later that his name was Burke and that he was a fugitive from New York. Since his flight he has journeyed widely and has been in China, having returned from there with a personal feeling of intention to go back to the far east on the next steamer when arrested. The Pinkertons have been notified of Burke's capture and he will be held for a New York warrant.

JAMES B. FORGAN SAYS LA FOLLETTE SPOKE ROT

Chicago, March 18.—James B. Forgan, president of the First National bank of Chicago, and chairman of the currency committee of the bankers' association, in an interview today relative to the speech of United States Senator La Follette of Wisconsin in the state yesterday, said that the senator was false in his assertions and a pandering to class prejudice. “The speech was rot,” said Mr. Forgan. “It was worse than rot. It was a deliberate stirring up of passion and rage among people who have no facilities for acquiring knowledge at first hand and are dependent upon men whom they trust. This trust Senator La Follette has betrayed. He has taken advantage of his high office to use the confidence which his position lends to his words for the sake of arousing unreasoning prejudice among people who have a right to know the truth from him. The entire import of his speech is absolutely false. I have never heard so much utterly untrue and untrue verbiage quoted as coming from the lips of any one man.”

FOUR YEARS FOR FRAUD.  
Philadelphia, March 18.—Frank D. Marvin, alias Franklin Stone, who has been convicted of using the mails to defraud in connection with the Stone Cotton company, was today sentenced to four years' imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$5,000. He was later released on \$10,000 bail pending an appeal.

PARISIAN COURT STIRRED WHEN LABORER TALKED

Paris, March 18.—Maitre Labori today presented to the court the side of the husband in the divorce suit brought in this city from Mrs. A. Hart McKee against Mr. McKee. The first hearing of the case took place March 4, when Mrs. McKee, through her counsel, described certain alleged indignities to which she had been subjected by her husband. Today Maitre Labori made counter charges of a most scandalous character against the wife, and declared that if the court granted a divorce it should pronounce in favor of the defendant and not in favor of the plaintiff. Mrs. McKee is a daughter of George W. Baxter of Tennessee. She was the widow of Hugh Tevis at the time of her marriage to Mr. McKee in Philadelphia in January, 1905. Maitre Labori declared that Mrs. McKee married Mrs. Tevis to save her honor. He mentioned also an Italian marquis as a correspondent. “The allegations of Mr. McKee's cruelty to his wife and child and the flagrant wronging were denied and then, in support of the contention that Mr. McKee should receive the decree of divorce,” Maitre Labori proceeded to describe Mrs. McKee's alleged career while she was still Mrs. Tevis. He coupled her name with that of Lord Roslyn, and declared that she and Mr. McKee were living together at a hotel two days after they met. Continuing, counsel for the husband declared that his client had paid Mrs. McKee's bill, amounting to \$1,000, while she was in the south of Europe, and to disprove the charge of parsimony against him he declared that during a single night McKee had spent \$320 on flowers for his wife.

COMMISSION TO PROBE FRAUDULENT ENTRIES

Helena, Mont., March 18.—Upon statements made to President Roosevelt by a special commission sent to Montana by the mine owners' association concerning the alleged fraudulent classification by the commission appointed under the McKinley regime in relation to the mineral lands of the Northern Pacific railroad the president has instructed Secy. of the Interior Garfield to make a thorough investigation of the charges. J. A. Howard, who was chairman of the committee which called at the White House, said tonight that Secy. Garfield assured him that a commission will be appointed to conduct an investigation during the coming summer at some central point in this state. Sixty instances of alleged fraud were presented to the federal officials by the committee, and upon its return to Helena today Mr. Howard found 32 other cases. Title to millions of acres of Montana, whose value is almost incalculable, and whose possession has been claimed by the Northern Pacific, is now brought into question. Mine owners from all over the state have combined to defeat the claim of the railroad to these lands, and they are making special efforts to secure evidence in those cases where the railroad was victorious before the former classification commission in contentions with resident claimants. Starting disclosures have already been made and the operators are jubilant over the assured support of the administration in their fight.

## NEW YORK HAVING A SENATE INQUIRY

Attorney General William Schuyler Jackson Again in The Limelight.

Albany, N. Y., March 18.—In the legislature today Senator Martin Saxe of New York introduced a concurrent resolution providing for a legislative investigation of the conduct of the office of the attorney-general of the state during the administration of the present incumbent, William Schuyler Jackson of Buffalo, especially with reference to receiverships of banks and trust companies. Mr. Jackson was elected on the Democratic-Independence League ticket in November, 1906, and has been in office since Jan. 1, 1907. The general impression about the conduct of his office is that the resolution will be adopted and the investigation will be instituted.

THE CHARGES MADE.  
The essential paragraph of the resolution recites that during the recent panic a large number of financial institutions in New York City were compelled to suspend, and that it has since been widely charged that the office of the attorney-general has been used by Mr. Jackson and his subordinates to assist banks and trust companies; that he has used the appointment of political adherents as receivers of such institutions, and that by “corrupt practices in the attorney-general's office the present financial depression and distress have been prolonged.” Senator Saxe said today that he introduced the resolution at the instance of certain bankers in New York City whose names he might give later, but that he represented his own views. Atty.-Gen. Jackson said tonight that he would welcome an investigation of his office conducted in an impartial manner, without personal feeling or any consideration of politics.

TROUBLE OVER WOMAN STARTS SHOOTING AFFRAY

Prescott, Ariz., March 18.—A message from Harrington, about 50 miles south of here, says: Clarence Sarten is killed, and William Wheeler and Dave Alexander are wounded and under arrest, as the result of a shooting affray early this morning. Wheeler and Alexander were visiting a woman last night, who Sarten called at the house and demanded entrance, which was refused. He then fired through the door with a shotgun, wounding Alexander in the chest. Wheeler returned the fire with a pistol slightly wounding Sarten, who departed. He later returned and met the men as they were leaving the house. Sarten opened fire, wounding Wheeler, who returned the fire, shooting Sarten through the chest, the bullet coming out of the back, killing him almost instantly.

QUIET AT PORT AU PRINCE.

Port Au Prince, Hayti, March 18.—The situation here today continues tranquil. Three other warships have arrived in port, the American cruiser Des Moines, the American gunboat Paducah and the English cruiser Cressy.

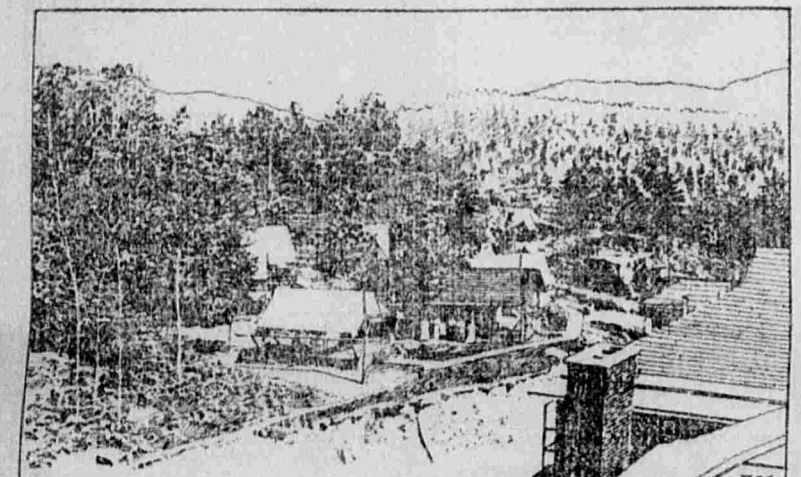

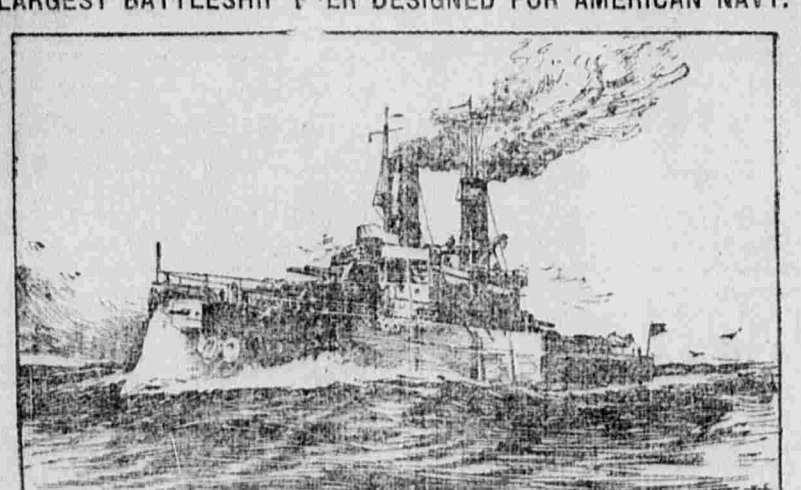
