Delegates from the Territories. WASHINGTON, 11.-The committee Washington, 11.—The committee appointed at a meeting of representative democrats of the Territories waited on the President to-day and presented a series of resolutions, earnestly requesting him, at his earliest convenience, to look into the political and administrative condition of the Territories. The resolutions set forth that the people of the Territories are not well governed, and the President is requested to afford relief by placing requested to afford relief by placing good men, citizens respectively of the Territories, in office. It is said by some of the interested democrats that the rule of choosing governors from actual itizens will be adhered to in every ase, but in the selection of the judi-lary, customs, revenue and land office appointments, the field will not be restricted. For such positions, citizens of the States, as well as the Territories, will be deemed eligible.

The Colored Men. DEPARTMENT OF STATE, Washington, April 10, 1885.

James Flynn, Corresponding Secretary Irish National League, New York Sir: I have received and given due onsideration to your letter of the 28th oit, and the resolution therein communicated. This department is ready to lend promptly all lawful ald in its power to secure a just and fair trial to iny American citizen, whether native or naturalized, criminally charged in foreign countries and triable in such arisdiction. There is, however, no provision by existing law to defray the xpense of employing legal counsel for the defense of citizens so accused and held for trial or for the employ-ment of agents to attend and report the proceedings. I trust, however, the President will recommend and that Congress will provide a reasonable and adequate sum of money in order that a careful supervision of such important trials as may involve the lives or liberties of American citizens may be had and an intelligent report of the proceedings be made, especially where the charge is serious and the accused lestitute of means and without friends The Department will take seculous interest in the treatment of law-abiding American citizens whilst in foreign countries, and do whatever lies within its power to secure for them the fullest protection of the laws, and, when charged with offenses, all their rights to a fair and a public trial and all legal defenses. An Inter-Oceanic Railway. LONDON, 11 .- A London syndicate has entered into a contract with the government of Honduras to build and operate in that country an inter-oceanic railway. The concession granted the syndicate by Honduras inludes land grants and mining privi-

A Panie Averted.

London, 11.—Selling on the Stock Exchange was resumed this afternoon by operators for a fall, and a panic which was imminent, was only checked by continued purchases for Berlin account. The German bourses rely on the truth of the reports that the Emperor of Germany is assiduous in urging the Czar to oppose the war party In Russia, and also that Prince Bismarck, if a point is reached where the diplomatic relations of England and Russia are broken, will offer the mediation of Germany.

Predicting War.

BRUSSRLS, 11 .- Le Nord, the most rabid pro-Russian newspaper in Bel-gium, now predicts war between Rus-sia and England. Le Nord is regarded as the semi-official organ of the Russian govern-ment, and this article is believed to have been inspired by it. The paper has hitherto expressed sanguine hopes of peace, but it now says war is impending. It says the open threats and insults to Russia contained in the toasts of the Ameer of Afghanistan and Lord Dufferin were equivalent to a declaration of war, even while England was appealing for conciliation.

Russia would have greater justification in demanding that England explain her occupation of Quelpaert than England has in asking Russia to explain the at-tack on the Afghans by Gen. Komaroff. The former matter is of great import-

The national anthem was sung by the whole audience, and when the Czar advanced to the front of his box and bowed his thanks he was greeted with a hurricane of cheers. The ovation was continued outside the theater, and the royal party was followed by crowds of people to the gates of the palace.
