terday, and reports great destitution in that State, in some districts actual starvation.

The *World's* Washington special says the final dissolution of the 20th army corps took place to-day. A complete history of its organization was filled in the War department.

Twenty-two regiments were mustered out from this corps in one day.

The 15th is the last day in which all Major-Generals and Brigadier-Generals who are without commands, or not on detached service, can remain with that rank in the army.

Butler and Banks go out of Service under this order.

Washington, 15.

The condition of Frederick Seward continues most encouraging.

Secretary Seward's health continues to improve. He now regularly attends to business and converses cheerfully with friends, though his jaw is still supported by an iron frame work.

Numerous applications for pardon have been filed in the Attorney-General's office.

New York, 16.

The *Time's* special says 8,000 troops left for their homes to-day. The last of Sherman's army left for the west this p. m.

The dry goods trade remains dull in almost every department. Domestic fabrics, heavy bleached and brown goods are lower. Standard sheetings can be bought at 28½, which is nearly down to the lowest point of the season.

Hamilton, of Texas, is to be provisional Governor of that State. James Johnson, of Georgia, is to be Provisional Governor of Georgia. The form of proclamation will be similar to those heretofore appointing Provisional Governors for North Carolina and Mississippi. The duties prescribed are the same.

New York, 17.

The *Herald's* correspondent in the Gulf Department says, on the 2d, the rebel Generals Kirby Smith and Magruder were received on board the United States steamer Ft. Jackson, Capt. Sands, off Galveston, when the articles of the surrender of all the rebel trans-Mississippi forces were signed by Smith. On the 5th, Capt. Sands and other officers proceeded up to the town, landed and received its surrender.

Liverpool, 9.

Lord Palmerston tendered a pension of £1,500 to Mrs. Cobden, who gratefully declined.

There were 50 wrecks and much loss of life from a storm in the Baltic.

Washington, 18.

The British government has withdrawn its recognition of Confederate vessels of war and issued orders prohibiting them to enter any British port.

France has also removed the restrictions on naval intercourse, and withdrawn from the Confederates the character of belligerents.

New York, 18.

Advices from Hayti to the 27th ult., represent the rebellion against the Government still in progress, with success on both sides.

The *Herald's* correspondent says Maximilian has given a liberal subsidy to the Vera Cruz and New York steamship line, and Ben Holladay's line from Mazatlan to San Francisco. An American company has the exclusive privilege of building and running horse railroads in the city of Mexico. Another has a charter for a railway of 120 miles between Queretaro and Queretaro. Patents for a large number of American inventions have been granted. A hotel on the New York plan is now building.

There are now in Mexico about 40,000 European troops. Of those, 25,000 are French, mostly Zouaves; 8,000 Austrians, and 4,000 Belgians.

Cairo, 19.

Gen. Reynolds has taken proper steps towards establishing civil courts throughout Northern Arkansas. Garrisons have been established along the White river.

New York, 19.

Additional details of the war between Brazil and Paraguay confirm the reports of the defeat of the Brazilian troops.

The steamer James Adger, from Cape Haytien 13th, has arrived.

Cape Haytien has been in a state of siege for seven days.

Washington, 19.

The family of President Johnson and his daughter, Mrs. Patterson, have arrived to take charge of the Executive Mansion.

Cairo, 20.

The U. S. transport, Kentucky, with 900 passengers, principally paroled prisoners and their families, left Shreveport for New Orleans on the 9th.

About 9 o'clock the same night they discovered the boat taking water rapidly and, before she was landed, sunk in about 20 feet of water. The loss of life must have been terrible—she being much crowded and sinking inside of three minutes. It is supposed that 200 persons perished. She had also 250 horses on board—all of which were lost, except three. The passengers lost everything. The paroled prisoners on board were principally members of Missouri regiments. The officers of the steamer were saved.

St. Louis, 20.

All the business portion of Rolla, Mo., was burned last night. The loss is estimated at 200,000 dollars—but little insurance.

Halifax, 20.

The Emperor Napoleon had returned to Paris.

Washington, 20.

Governor Holden has issued his first proclamation to the people of North Carolina. He informs them that a convention to alter and amend the State Constitution, to provide for the election of Governor and Legislature and to put the civil machinery in full operation, would be held at as early a period as practicable. Undoubted loyalty to the national government would be required of the delegates in the convention, and of all persons who vote. Those desiring to vote will be required to take the oath of allegiance and so prove their good will to the national government.

AN ORDINANCE,

Repealing Certain Ordinances and in Relation to Nuisances.

SEC. 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of Great Salt Lake City, that an Ordinance, entitled, "An Ordinance, regulating the manufacture and sale of Spirituous and Fermented Liquors;" passed March 12th, 1860, and an Ordinance amendatory thereto, passed, March 24th, 1864; together with all other Ordinances, or parts of Ordinances, relating to the manufacturing, selling or vending of Spirituous, Vinous or Fermented Liquors, together with all Ordinances and parts of Ordinances authorizing the granting of Licenses for the same; be and the same are hereby repealed; Provided, that nothing in the above shall be so construed as to prohibit the City, by its legally appointed agent, from manufacturing, buying or selling Spirituous, Vinous or Fermented Liquors for medicinal or other useful purposes; and the proceeds thereof to be paid into the Treasury quarterly, or, oftener if required, for the benefit of the Corporation; Provided, further, that nothing contained in this Ordinance shall affect persons to whom Licenses have heretofore been granted, until such Licenses shall have expired.

SEC. 2. Be it further ordained, that an Ordinance, entitled, "An Ordinance in relation to Billiard Tables, Ball Alleys and other places of Public Amusement," passed Sept. 10th, 1864; be, and the same is hereby repealed.

SEC. 3. Any house, or place established in this City for the purpose of manufacturing, selling or giving away of Spirituous, Vinous or Fermented Liquors; except as provided in this Ordinance; or, for Billiard playing, or any other gaming of any name or kind whatsoever; the same shall be and is hereby declared a nuisance and shall be removed or abated as such; and the person or persons owning, keeping or conducting any such establishment shall be liable to a fine for each offence, in any sum not less than ten dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding six months, or both fine and imprisonment. Passed June 20th, 1865.
