

THE TERRITORIAL LEGISLATURE.

HOUSE.—Reuben Andrew Robinson petitioned to have his name changed to Reuben Andrew Blasedale; petition read and referred.

Mr. Richards moved that the Speaker be requested to instruct such committee as he shall deem most proper, to inquire into the propriety and importance of compiling and publishing from the Statutes at Large all such laws as are applicable to or in force in the Territory of Utah, and that said committee report by bill or otherwise. Seconded and carried.

Messrs. Richards and Farr were appointed said special committee.

Mr. Wright presented a bill for an Act pertaining to Marriage; ordered printed and referred to Committee on Judiciary. Adjourned till Tuesday at 1 p. m.

COUNCIL.—Council met pursuant to adjournment.

Councillor Bigler presented petition of S. B. Young, praying to be appointed to the office of Notary Public, which was read and referred.

Councillor Jesse N. Smith, from Committee on Counties, reported it inexpedient at present to legislate on petition of George W. Sevey and others, praying for the organization of a new county. Report accepted.

Councillor Jennings, from committee, reported back adversely petition signed by George C. Bates and thirteen others, accompanying a "bill to amend Sections 2 and 6 of an Act providing for Incorporating Associations for Mining, Manufacturing, Commercial and other Industrial Pursuits," approved February 18, 1870. Report accepted.

Councillor Cannon, from Committee on Mineral Resources, reported in lieu of an Act relating to the discovery of Gold and Silver Quartz Lodes and other mineral in rock in place and the manner of their location, a substitute entitled, "An Act to provide rules for the working and development of mines," which was read and ordered printed.

Councillor Cannon presented a bill for "an Act for the prevention of Frauds and Perjuries," which was read and referred; also a bill for "an Act prescribing a summary mode of procedure for the recovery of the possession of real property forcibly or unlawfully withheld," which was read and referred.

Councillor Lot Smith presented a bill for "an Act in relation to Obnoxious Weeds," which was read and referred.

"An Act establishing Estray Pounds and prescribing regulations for conducting the same," was read, and

On motion of Councillor Cannon, its title was amended to read "an Act establishing Precinct and District Pounds and prescribing regulations for conducting the same and for disposing of Estray Animals." Passed.

Councillor Cannon gave notice that tomorrow he would introduce a bill for "an Act concerning property rights of married persons," with the permission of the Council. Leave was granted.

Council adjourned.

HOUSE.—Petition from Mr. S. B. Young for an appointment to the office as Notary Public was read and referred.

The bill of Auditor for Stationery was read and referred.

Petition of Wm. C. A. Smoot and 37 other citizens of the South East portion of Salt Lake City to be detached from said city corporation, read and referred.

"An Act providing for granting Licenses to persons engaged in certain kinds of business," was read and passed.

The Committee on Judiciary were instructed to examine the Mechanics' Lien Law and so amend the same as to secure sub-contractors, and report by bill.

The Committee on Judiciary reported back the bill authorizing the Secretary of the Territory to receive fees in certain cases, which was referred.

The Committee on Judiciary reported back the Communications of Z. Snow, Attorney General, and Wm. Clayton, Auditor of Public Accounts, with recommendations that the same be printed in the Journals and in pamphlet form for the use of both Houses.

Adjourned till Wednesday at 1 p. m.

Wednesday, Jan. 31.

COUNCIL.—Council met pursuant to adjournment.

Councillor Smoot, from Committee, reported back "An Act designating the time of holding the first election for City Officers for Washington City, in Washington County," with amendments and recommending its passage. Report accepted.

"An Act designating the time of holding the first election for City Officers for Washington City, in Washington County," was passed.

"An Act further defining the duties of Superintendent of the Salt Lake and Wanship Wagon road, and repealing certain acts relating thereto," was amended and passed.

Councillor Harrington, from Committee on Judiciary, reported back "An Act defining the time of commencing civil actions," amended, title and otherwise, and passed.

Joint resolution, providing for holding a convention to elect delegates, etc., was read and passed.

Councillor Cannon presented a bill for "An Act concerning property rights of married persons, which was read and referred.

On motion of Councillor Woodruff, the Council adjourned.

HOUSE.—Petition of W. H. Lee and 169 others, citizens of Tooele county, praying for a free school system, was read and referred.

Mr. Wright presented remonstrance of Henry E. Perry and 800 others, citizens of Box Elder County, in relation to the division of said county, which was read and referred.

"An Act establishing district and precinct pounds and prescribing regulations for conducting the same; and for disposing of stray animals," was read and referred.

Mr. Rich, from committee on claims and appropriations, reported back the estimate of the Auditor of Public Accounts for stationery for the years 1872 and 1873, with recommendation that the estimated amount be placed in the appropriation bill; recommendation endorsed.

Mr. Rowberry moved that the committee on claims and appropriations be instructed to incorporate in the Territorial appropriation bill the sum of \$500 or as much thereof as may be necessary, to defray the expenses incurred in locating University lands, and that the same be made subject to the order of the commissioners elect to locate said lands. Referred.

The financial report of Salt Lake county was received and referred.

The report of the Territorial Superintendent of Common Schools was received and read.

On motion of Mr. John Taylor, one thousand copies thereof was ordered printed in pamphlet form. Referred.

Mr. Pitchforth moved that, in consideration of the many petitions presented in favor of the establishment of free schools by taxation, the House meet on Friday next at 8:30 p. m., in committee of the whole, to consider the subject; seconded and carried.

The House non-concurred in the Council amendment of the bill designating the time of holding the first election for city officers in Washington City.

A preamble and resolution were reported by the chairman of the special committee appointed to express the sense of the House pertaining to the Governor's veto, which was read and adopted unanimously.

The House non-concurred in the bill defining the duties of the superintendent of the Salt Lake and Wanship wagon road, and a committee of conference was asked for on the subject.

The committee on claims reported adversely on the petition of the assessor and collector of Weber County; report endorsed.

Adjourned till Thursday at one p. m.
