

EMPEROR OF JAPAN TO THE PRESIDENT

Thanks Him for His "Disinterested And Unremitting Efforts in Interest of Peace and Humanity"

IS SATISFIED WITH TREATY.

Cablegram Puts an End to Rumors That He Was Not Will Be Signed Early.

Oester Bay, Sept. 3.—President Roosevelt today received at 12:49 p. m. from the emperor of Japan warm thanks for his "disinterested and unremitting efforts in the interests of peace and humanity."

The emperor puts an end to the rumors that he was not satisfied with the terms finally concluded by his plenipotentiaries with those of the emperor of Russia.

The delay in responding to the Japanese plenipotentiaries was due, it is suggested, to the desire of the emperor to be assured that the terms agreed upon would be incorporated into a treaty without the probability of a serious hitch.

That assurance, it is said, was conveyed in the Japanese emperor's last night upon the practical conclusion of the draft of the treaty.

Information reaching the president today from Portsmouth indicates that the treaty will be concluded formally and signed early this week, probably tomorrow or Tuesday.

President Roosevelt passed his greater part of the day at Sagamore Hill. He and Mrs. Roosevelt, with some of their children, attended morning services at Christ Episcopal church.

No official visitors were received during the day, although Representative Wadsworth of New York and Mrs. Wadsworth were house guests of the president and Mrs. Roosevelt.

TREATY READY FOR SIGNATURE.

It Consists of a Preamble and Seventeen Articles, More Than First Expected.

DIFFERENCES AS TO WORDING.

Japanese Envoys Hope to Get Away Tuesday; Russians That Day Or Wednesday.

Portsmouth, Sept. 3.—From an official source the Associated Press is informed that the treaty is completed. It consists of a preamble and 17 articles, the substance of which has been given in the Associated Press dispatches. But there were still differences about the wording of the protocol at the last sitting, which must be signed before the treaty itself can be signed.

The seventeenth and concluding article of the treaty provides for the exchange of ratifications, which will occur within 30 days after its signature by the plenipotentiaries.

The plenipotentiaries have invited Gov. Adams to witness the signing of the treaty, and he has been telegraphed for.

Mr. De Martens, who is extremely anxious to get back to Russia, has engaged passage on La Lorraine, sailing from New York Thursday, and leaves here on Wednesday.

After being treated to every variety of weather, the peace conference promises to end in the midst of a raging northeaster. Since last night it has been blowing a gale, accompanied by torrents of rain.

Baron Komura, on the other hand, could with the greatest difficulty be induced to enter into the region of argument. He stuck to the brief before him, speaking always quite slowly.

Both systems had their advantages. By installing Baron Komura would sometimes catch M. Witte off his guard and provoke him into statements which were always eagerly seized upon.

Then Baron Komura would go back and restate his proposition almost exactly as he had done originally.

Now, when the Japanese are still continuing their policy of insistence upon words or phrases, M. Witte is showing considerable impatience.

Especially at St. Petersburg there is constant danger that instructions at the last moment may come in to get this concession or that concession, thus bringing only diplomatic discussions which might indefinitely prolong the negotiations.

side for the protection of private rights and property acquired under Russian control in South Sakhalin and in Dalny, Port Arthur and other places in the Lantung peninsula.

M. Witte will personally convey the text to St. Petersburg and Baron Komura to Tokyo.

To avoid the delay of exchange of documents, which would involve six weeks at least, notification of the final approval by the emperors will be made through neutrals, the United States in the case of Japan and France in the case of Russia.

The signing of the treaty is to be a very exciting event. The Japanese objected to the presence of any newspaper correspondents or photographers, and it has therefore been decided that only the plenipotentiaries and assistants will be present.
