

REPUBLICAN SPEAKERS' BUREAU
 Joseph M. Dixon of Montana Appointed Director by National Committee.

HEADQUARTERS IN CHICAGO

Has an Extensive Acquaintance With Leading Party Men and a Congressional Experience.

Chicago, Aug. 31.—Senator Joseph Dixon of Montana was today appointed by chairman Frank Hitchcock of the Republican national committee director of the speakers' bureau of Chicago headquarters. The service Senator Dixon as a member of the United States senate has equipped him for the position for the reason that he is familiar with the qualifications of members of Congress for active campaigning. He has a wide acquaintance among leaders of the Republican party in the western states who he is called upon to fill speaking engagements.

Chairman Hitchcock began his personal conference today within 10 minutes after he reached the city from New York. He had breakfast on the train and proceeded directly to the headquarters in the Harvesters building, where he was met by a large number of his friends. It was announced today that Mr. Dixon would make his first campaign speech in this city, probably before the Hamilton club, on Sept. 28. He will continue speaking in the state for the next three days. Representative McKinley, chairman of the Republican congressional committee, is expected tomorrow to confer with Chairman Hitchcock, and they will then make up Mr. Sherman's time card for the campaign. HYPNOTIC STORY OF A WIFE'S CRIME

Hypnotist Tells How He Obtained Influence Over Her and Listened to Her Talk.

TOLD OF SHOOTING HUSBAND.

Very Detailed—Doctor Thinks She Was Insane Then but is of Sound Mind Now.

New York, Sept. 1.—Hypnotism and evidence secured by its means from Mrs. Charlotte Hitchcock, who is accused of shooting her husband on Nov. 20, last, figured largely in the testimony yesterday before the lunacy commission. After a dispute among the members of the commission, Doctors McDonald, Hamilton and Robertson and Albert J. Tally, counsel for Mrs. Hitchcock, Judge Foster decided that the woman's mental condition at the present time should be considered, as well as her state at the time of the shooting.

Dr. E. J. Van Glendon testified that he had hypnotized Mr. Hitchcock in a cell at the Tombs and obtained his first and only story of the crime. He told how with the use of a small dose of formaldehyde he had reduced her to a state of sub-consciousness, and then, while her head was tilted slightly back and rested on a pillow, he had stood behind her while a stenographer took down her statements.

"I went out to get a steak and cook it," Mrs. Hitchcock said, according to Dr. Van Glendon's testimony. "Bob came in with some apples and after eating the steak, read a magazine. Then he said: 'I'm in a hole. There's only one way out. We must cross the river Jordan.' He read to me out of the Testament and then said: 'I have ruined our lives. He made me write a piece of paper. I don't know what it is. He got a revolver and shot me three times. I ran into the kitchen. My waist was on fire. He helped me put out the fire. Then he crawled back and tried to get the gun, but it went off. Bob shot at me again. Then he stood upon the bed and shot himself three times. A dark policeman and a policeman came in. I told them I had shot Bob. I did it because he had told me to take the blame.'"

Dr. Van Glendon said he thought Mrs. Hitchcock was insane at the time of the shooting, but was sane now.

Mr. Connors said he still believes the Clout-Gow bill is the strongest candidate for state governor, but that the state convention would be doubtless guided in its selection of candidates by the state put up by the Republicans.

ALLISON'S SUCCESSOR.

Gov. Cummins Urges Necessity of Amending Primary Law.

Des Moines, Ia., Aug. 31.—Gov. A. B. Cummins in his message to the special session convened here today, urged the importance of amending the primary law so as to permit Republicans to make a nomination for senator this fall. He also pointed out the duty of the legislature to elect a successor to the late Senator Allison for the short term and said that if it fails there can be no senator until the next legislature elects, as his power of appointment has passed.

DONOHU MURDER.

Circumstantial Evidence Seems to Point to Arkell as Guilty Party.

that Arkell will soon break down and tell all he is believed to know of the crime. The police declare there are two strong links in the chain of circumstantial evidence which point to Arkell's guilt. One is the statement that the man, who was a well digger, had owned the spade with which the grave was dug for the body of the murdered woman; the other is the fact that Arkell had in his possession a gold pocket said to have been the property of Mrs. Donohue.

It developed today that Mrs. Donohue was insured for \$20,000 in the various policies to which she belonged, but the police do not think this had anything to do with the crime, nor are they inclined to believe that more than one person had a hand in the murder.

SERENO PAYNE RENOMINATED FOR FOURTEENTH TIME

Auburn, N. Y., Aug. 31.—For the fourteenth time Sereno Payne, chairman of the ways and means committee, and leader of the lower house, was renominated by the Republicans of the Thirty-first congressional district. In an address accepting the renomination Representative Payne said he believed the district had no action in the revision of the tariff.

"Our rivals in trade, Germany and France, have adopted a maximum and minimum of tariff," said he, "and under our existing law we are unable to obtain their minimum rate without too great a sacrifice to American industry. We can only meet them on their own ground with a maximum and minimum tariff. The consideration alone would be sufficient to justify a revision."

REV. CLYDE W. GOW DEPOSED FROM PASTORATE

Hannibal, Mo., Aug. 31.—Rev. Clyde W. Gow, charged with improper conduct in relation to the death of Miss Elizabeth Gleason, a teacher, who died at Elsberry, Mo., after an operation, was found guilty by the trial committee of the annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal church (South) now in this city. The verdict was read to the conference and Mr. Gow was deposed from his pastorate. The dying statement of Miss Gleason accusing the pastor was the evidence that convicted him. An appeal will be taken. Gow waited outside the conference building, and when told the verdict, displayed no feeling.

PRESIDENT APPROVES PLANS FOR BATTLESHIP UTAH

Washington, Aug. 31.—President Roosevelt has approved the plans of the proposed new battleships Florida and Utah, which were authorized at the last session of Congress. In the course of his examination he sought the advice of commander W. S. Sims and Lieutenant-commander Arthur L. Dyer, naval authorities, what are regarded as radical opinions respecting naval construction, and who frankly criticized some of the features of the new ships. The prompt approval by the president of the plans is evidence that the president is not only impressed with the arguments of the critics. It is expected that advertisements for bids for the construction of the Utah will be published in a few days. That vessel is to be constructed at naval shipyards, while the Florida is to be built at the Brooklyn navy-yard.

TO LOOK AFTER COLLEGE VOTES FOR REPUBLICANS

New York, Aug. 31.—It was announced at the Republican national headquarters today that Alfred E. Hunt of Boston, president of the National College League, has been appointed to look after the college votes in the interest of the Republican nominees in the present campaign.

GEORGIA'S CONVICT SYSTEM.

Effort to Reform It at Special Session of Legislature May be Abortive.

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 31.—Georgia's efforts to correct the convict lease system through legislation at a special session of the house and senate of the state may not amount to much, as it was today that the measure known as the Holder bill, which has already passed the house, does not meet with the approval of Gov. Hoke Smith, and that he will not sign it under any circumstances. There is no limit to the time of the extra session and there were reports about the certainty that it would be prolonged beyond October. Early in October the regular election in Georgia will be held and with this election the terms of the present members of the general assembly will expire.

The extraordinary session of the new legislature will be embarrassing, as one of its first duties would be to canvass the vote for governor and declare Joseph M. Brown governor of the state in succession to Hoke Smith. A minority report from the judiciary committee today recommended that the prison commission be abolished.

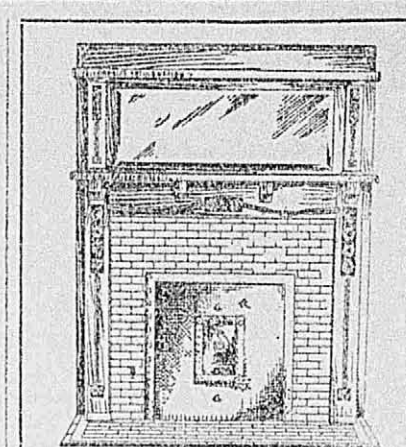

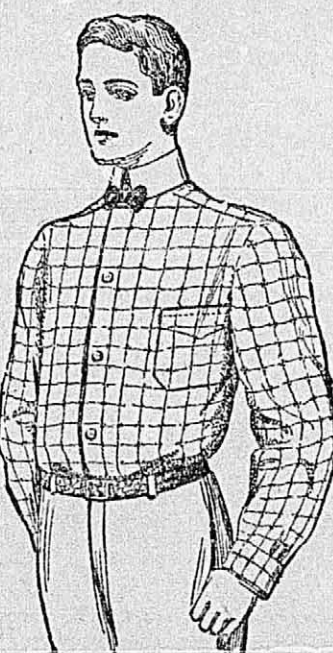
