Position Proffered to Sheriff Jos. W. Bailey, Who May Resign Shrievally.

TO COMPLETE LINE BY APRIL 1

Mr. Bamberger Expects to Have Cars Running for Conference and Summer Traffic.

Ogden, Oct. 19.—There is a possibility of Sheriff Joseph W. Bailey becoming superintendent of Simon Bamberger's Ogden & Salt Lake car line in Ogden, but the matter as yet is in a very undecided state, and as no definite propositions have been decided upon it was not intended the story should get out yet. Sheriff Bailey, when asked concerning the report, stated that he and Mr. Bamberger had discussed the matter only in a casual way and that no offer direct of the position had been made him, hence he could not say whether he would accept or not.

Should the important place be accepted by Mr. Bailey, it would necessitate his resignation as sheriff, in which event Chief Deputy Sebring would likely be appointed sheriff.

There is no man in Ogden more capable of superintending Bamberger's line in this city than Mr. Bailey. His experience in superintending the Ogden Road Transit company's lines here for several years gave him the practical experience, and he possesses every other qualification. It is understood that Mr. Bailey is asked to accept the appointment and decides to do so, the duties of his new office would commence about the first of next year. Mr. Bamberger expects to get his line completed between Ogden and Salt Lake by about April 1, 1906, so it is stated, ready for the conference and summer railroad business between Ogden and Salt Lake.

MISS MARY PURDIE DEAD.
Estimable Young Woman Succumbs to Sudden Illness.

Ogden, Utah, Oct. 19.—A very sad and unexpected death occurred in Ogden at 1:25 p. m. yesterday, when Miss Mary Scott Purdie departed this life at the family residence, 572 Twenty-third street, after two days' illness. The announcement of her sudden demise will come as a great surprise to her many friends throughout the city, as few had learned of her illness. Monday Miss Purdie was down town, and selected a basket for her sister's little infant babe, that was born Monday and died soon after its birth. During the night she was taken with severe pains in her back, and medical attention was given her. Her loved ones thought she was recovering, but instead she lapsed into unconsciousness during Tuesday night, from which she never revived, passing peacefully away at the hour mentioned. Miss Purdie was the daughter of William N. Purdie, was born at Glasgow, Scotland, July 27, 1875, and with her parents came to Ogden when a little girl, living here ever since. She was an active worker in the Fourth ward in the Young Ladies' association, in the Sunday school and choir. Five months ago her mother died. Miss Purdie was a self-sacrificing young lady, lovable and kind, making friends of all who made her acquaintance, and was true to her religious convictions. Her sister, Mrs. Oron Payne, is also in a critical condition at her father's home. The funeral services will be held at the Fourth ward meetinghouse Sunday at 2 o'clock. Her remains may be viewed at the home on date of funeral between 10 a. m. and 1 p. m.

PUBLIC LIBRARY MOVEMENT.

Strong Committee Actively at Work With Promise of Success.

Provo, Utah, Oct. 19.—The Provo city free public library committee met last evening in the council chamber and effected an organization with the following officers: Chairman, Dr. F. W. Taylor; secretary, Mrs. Samuel A. King; executive committee—Dr. F. W. Taylor, R. R. Irvine, Jr., and Rev. S. H. Goodwin.

The committee will take immediate action to start the library at an early date as possible. The executive committee will examine several locations for the library during the week, and report at the next meeting to be held on the 26th.

There will be raised from the library tax, this year, \$800. The committee will keep the expenses for rent, etc., down as low as possible so that a large proportion of this amount may be expended for about 20 volumes which will be donated, and with the energetic work which this committee is prepared to give to the movement, it is safe to promise the citizens that a very respectable library will be opened to them in a short time.

Alleged Extortionist Forfeits \$200 Cash Bond Rather Than Face The Court.

VERDICT FOR WATER COMPANY.

Stewart Declines Republican Nomination for City Council—Marriage Licenses.

Ogden, Oct. 19.—The case of the state vs. Michael Berlin, charged with extortion, was called in the district court today by Judge Armstrong. The defendant failed to appear, either in person or by attorney, and at the request of District Attorney Halverson his cash bond of \$200 was declared forfeited. The court then issued a bench warrant for his arrest. Berlin is thought to have left the state and his whereabouts are unknown. Another case is pending against him, that of attempting to bribe the district attorney, whom he offered the sum of \$200 to withdraw the complaint charging him with extortion.

WATER COMPANY WINS.

The case of James Briggs vs. Strong's Canyon Water company and Ogden City was decided this morning in favor of the water company. Ogden City having previously been withdrawn as a party defendant. This is the last of a number of such cases, all of which have been decided in favor of the defendant. The plaintiffs will now be compelled to rent the water from the company.

ENTERPRISE BANK FAILURE.

Furnished Most of Funds to Float Santa Fe Central and Pennsylvania Development Co.

STATE WILL LOSE NOTHING

Bank Examiner Hard at Work but Not Prepared to Make a Statement.

Pittsburg, Oct. 19.—The investigation of the affairs of the Enterprise National bank, Allegheny City, Pa., is making good progress. Far into last night and the early hours of today John B. Cunningham, national bank examiner, who was appointed receiver of the institution pending his investigation assisted by a large clerical force, labored steadily in an effort to unravel the extent of the bank's financial embarrassment. The developments following the tragedy and the closing of the bank have been startling, involving as they do, the names of several prominent citizens who have been active in state politics.

According to President Gwinner, the bank, through Cashier Clarke, has furnished most of the funds used to float the Santa Fe Central railroad and the Pennsylvania Development company, in which former State Senators W. H. Andrews and Arthur Kennedy, and Francis J. Torrance were deeply interested together with Cashier Clarke. The two projects are allied ones. 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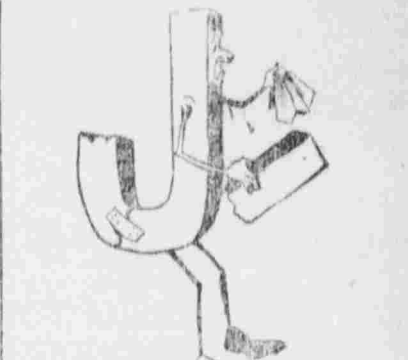
