

BRYAN ACCEPTS PEOPLE'S VERDICT

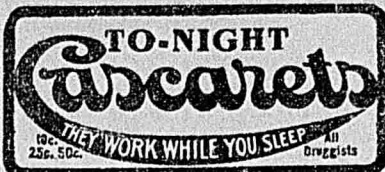
Made Fight on Platform That
He Believed to be for Best
Good of Country.

HAS FAITH IN PUBLICITY.

Comments Work of National Democratic Committee—Entirely Satisfied With Chairman Mack.

Lincoln, Nov. 5.—William Jennings Bryan today issued the following statement:

"The election has gone against us by a decisive majority. The returns are not all in and it is impossible to say what causes contributed most to the Republican victory. We made our fight upon a platform which embodies what we believe to be good for the American people, but it is for the people themselves to decide what laws they desire and what methods of government they prefer. I have faith that the publicity which we asked for will yet convince itself to the American people, that the election of senators by the people will be secured, that the integrity of the trust will be maintained, that the principle of private monopoly, I am confident that the people will see the necessity for the labor legislation and the tariff reduction which our platform demanded. I am confident, too, that the educational work done in this campaign will result in securing greater protection to bank depositors. The above are the most prominent reforms for which we labored, and I believe that these reforms will yet come, together with more effective regulation of railroads and independence for the Philippines. I desire to commend the work of our national committee. I am entirely satisfied with Mr. Mack as the chairman and with the members of the committee. I do not see what they could have done more than they did, and as for myself, I put forth every effort in my power to secure victory for our cause. The nomination came from the hands of the voters. I have obeyed their command and have led as best I



could. Words will not express my gratitude for the devotion which has been shown by millions of Democrats during the past 12 years. Neither am I able to adequately express my appreciation for the kind words which have been spoken since the election. If I could regard the defeat as purely a personal one I would consider it a blessing rather than a misfortune, for I am relieved of the burdens and responsibilities of an office that is attractive only in proportion as it gives an opportunity to render a larger public service. But I shall serve as willingly in a private capacity as in a public one. God does not require great things of us. He only requires that we improve the opportunities that are presented, and I shall be glad to improve the opportunities for service presented by private life.

"In this hour of national defeat I find some consolation in the cordial support given by my neighbors, by the citizens of Lincoln and by the people of the state of Nebraska. With a Democratic governor and a Democratic legislature we shall be able to put into practice so much of the Democratic platform as relates to state legislation, and I trust that our state will be an example that will be an influence for good in the nation."

LORD NORTHCLIFFE.

Famous English Newspaper Man Guest Of the Pilgrims.

New York, Nov. 5.—Lord Northcliffe, the famous English newspaper publisher, who before his elevation by King Edward was Alfred Harmsworth, owner and publisher of the London Mail, London Times, Paris Mail and a number of less widely known journals and magazines, was the guest of honor tonight at a banquet of the Pilgrims of the United States at Delmonico's.

President Duncan read a letter of regret from President Roosevelt and a telegram from Mark Twain expressing his sorrow on being prevented

from attending. The toast of President Roosevelt and King Edward having been pledged, Mr. Duncan introduced Col. Harvey, who made the welcoming address to Lord Northcliffe. The British journalist and publisher in responding said:

"The object of the Pilgrims is the promotion of the sentiment of brotherhood among the nations, and especially the cultivation of an intimate friendship between the inhabitants of the United States and of the British Empire. Those relations, which have undergone a great many family tiffs in the last 200 years, have to the best of my knowledge never been so pleasant as at this time. I could not but work of the Pilgrim society and the good fellowship it has engendered have done much toward furthering the unity of the greatest republic of the world and that empire to which is attached one-fifth of the world's people."

ANNUAL REPORT OF GENERAL LAND OFFICE

Washington, Nov. 5.—In his annual report for the fiscal year 1907-1908, the general land office recommends the withdrawal from entry of all public lands which may be irrigated which are not now capable of being utilized for homes on that point he says:

"The proper step to take would be to classify the lands of the United States in order to ascertain what public lands, which in their present condition are incapable of affording a home, are susceptible of irrigation at a cost even much greater than that now entertained by the reclamation service, and to withdraw these lands from entry awaiting the time when they can be irrigated by made homes, either under the reclamation service or under the Carey act. It will be only a comparatively few years before an irrigation project which will cost as high as \$300 an acre will be considered practicable, the market for land justifying such an expenditure. No one can be hurt by such a withdrawal, for desert land which cannot be reclaimed by the individual effort of a settler can never become a home until water is brought to it by the government, state or by the expenditure of vast sums by private enterprise."

Mr. Bennett says the land office has recommended that suits be brought on timber land aggregating \$275,510. "There were secured," he added, "234 indictments for fraud, which resulted in 63 convictions and 60 acquittals, the remaining cases not yet having been tried. Two thousand eight hundred and eighty-five entries were cancelled because of adverse reports of special agents. By reason of investigations there have been recovered from fraudulent entry during the fiscal year 1907-8, a total of \$33,500 acres, exclusive of many relinquishments."

The total receipts of the office for the year were \$1,715,709, an increase over the previous year of \$1,162,531. The total area of land originally entered during the year is 19,090,265 acres, as compared with 19,077,000 total area upon which final proof was made is 8,068,444 acres.

CHINESE FEEL THAT THEY HAVE BEEN SLIGHTED

Peking, Nov. 5.—Though the American squadron has left Amoy, the matter of their presence at the southern port has been more than mentioned in Peking. Officials are silent and the impression of general humiliation at the fact that only a squadron came, instead of the whole fleet, cannot be concealed.

The meagerness of the reply of the foreign board to Admiral Sperry's messages of congratulation on the birthday of the dowager empress has also attracted attention, and it is clear that the throne has been indifferent to the whole affair. It is generally realized that the coming of the squadron and not the main fleet will have an unfavorable effect upon present relations.

The principal newspaper in China, in an unfriendly article today, approves the sending of a squadron instead of the whole fleet, and refers to "America's which in their present condition are incapable of affording a home, are susceptible of irrigation at a cost even much greater than that now entertained by the reclamation service, and to withdraw these lands from entry awaiting the time when they can be irrigated by made homes, either under the reclamation service or under the Carey act. BOTH OF THEM WEPT.

Husband and Wife as He Told of How He Tried to Kill Her.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 5.—On trial for shooting his wife four times last June in an attempt to slay her, Guy Hadley, a white-haired man, 60 years of age, broke down in tears as he stood in the superior court today and confessed that his real name was Elias Hamlet, and that prominent people in Indiana by the name of Hadley were his relatives. He changed his name assuming that of his mother, 15 years ago, following the death of his first wife. He was superintendent of a school works in Indianapolis 24 years ago, he testified, but he lost his position because of gambling. He drifted over the country as a gambler for many years, marrying his second wife some years ago. Hadley attempted to kill himself at the time he shot his wife. He said he did not know why he tried to kill her, as he had no reason for it. Both Hadley and his wife wept throughout the former's recital of his life's story. The old man said he had spent the night on his knees, imploring for courage to make this confession.

MINERS ENTOMBED ALIVE. THEIR FATE UNKNOWN

Benton, Ill., Nov. 5.—An explosion at the mine of Col. W. P. Bond, three miles west of Benton, at 4:30 o'clock this morning, wrecked the shaft, and as a result four short-lifers are entombed.

So terrific was the explosion that a car and pieces of railroad track were hurled from the bottom to the top of the shaft more than 500 feet, demolishing a steel tippie.

It is impossible to reach the short-lifers and their fate is unknown. A large force of men is trying to clear away the wreckage, but the work is proceeding slowly. Unless the men are reached soon they will suffocate.

The names of the entombed miners are George E. Reed, Patrick Daley, Perry Stevens and John Holmes.

Chicago, Nov. 6.—Eighteen children were rescued from a fire that started on the third floor of a four-story brick building last night which caused a loss of \$75,000.

The building is occupied by makers of children's clothing. Smoke from the fire was carried into the home of Isaac Lamb, where his 11 children were asleep, and they were rescued out by detectives aided by the father.

The detectives then ran to the home of Mrs. Mary Miller, where they carried out her seven children. The children in both families ranged in age from one to 12 years.

Edwin Vandeyck, Ex-Ink Expert, is Fined \$10,000.

Washington, Nov. 5.—Edwin Vandeyck, former ink expert of the bureau of engraving and printing, indicted in January last, charged with conspiracy to defraud the United States in connection with ink contracts, today withdrew a plea of not guilty and entered a plea of guilty to two counts. Justice Gould fined Vandeyck \$10,000. Vandeyck immediately paid the fine and the two remaining counts of the indictment were then dismissed.

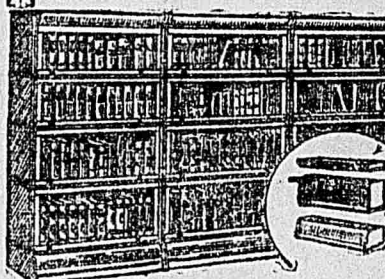

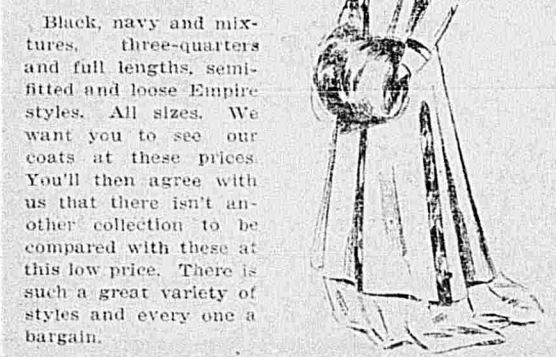
