Miss Mamie Morrell is visiting with friends in Ogden.

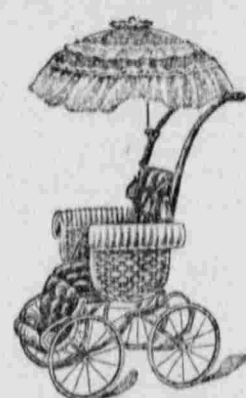

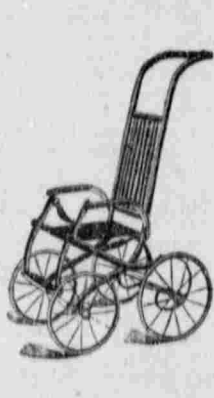

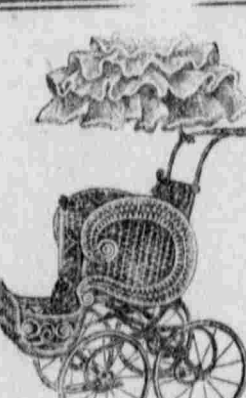
