

COOK ADHERES TO ORIGINAL PLAN

University of Copenhagen Will Make First Examination Of His Records.

HE WILL MAKE ONE REQUEST

It Is That Announcement of the Result Shall be Withheld for a Little While.

Baltimore, Oct. 4.—Dr. Frederick A. Cook, the explorer, reached this city at noon today, coming from Washington for his lecture here tonight. He was greeted at the railroad station by a few hundred persons.

At an informal reception at the city hall, Dr. Cook was introduced by Mayor Mahon to about a thousand persons. Before his lecture tonight, Dr. Cook was shown the Associated Press dispatch from Copenhagen relative to his reported intention to request the university of that city to waive its claim to the first examination of his records.

After reading the dispatch carefully, he said: "A wrong impression has been received in Denmark as to just what I said in Washington last night, and this, too, seems not to have been perfectly understood in this country. In order that there may be no further misunderstanding, I shall be glad to have the Associated Press announce, as coming from me, that I shall adhere to the original plan to have the University of Copenhagen make the first examination of my records, but that I shall ask that university to withhold the announcement of the result of such examination until the records shall have been examined simultaneously by all the geographical societies of the world. Immediately they have been examined by the University of Copenhagen, duplicate copies of my records will be submitted to all the geographical societies of the world and to any other scientific bodies desiring them."

Dr. Cook at first expressed an intention of calling to this effect to Denmark, but afterward decided the transmission of his statement to that country through the Associated Press would be preferable.

FEELING IN COPENHAGEN.

Copenhagen, Oct. 4.—The announcement of Dr. Cook's willingness to request the University of Copenhagen to waive its claim to the first examination of the records of his journey to the north pole caused keen disappointment, and whatever may be the reply of the university to the explorer's request, present indications do not foreshadow a graceful acquiescence on the part of the general public.

The rectors of the university today said: "No such request has yet been received from Dr. Cook and it is impossible to say what attitude the university will take toward the suggestion that American and other scientific bodies shall first review the explorer's data."

The action of the university will depend upon the reason Dr. Cook gives. The recorder concluded that strong influences may have been brought to bear upon Dr. Cook in order to cause him to make such a request.

The general public is inclined to be annoyed at the suggestion that foreign scientific bodies shall first see the records.

"The people consider the promise to give the university first opportunity of passing upon the records nothing but justice in view of the honors heaped upon the explorer by both the university and the Danish public and their unending support and belief in his exploits."

PEARY CLUB MEETING.

New York, Oct. 4.—The officers of the Peary Arctic club held a meeting today formally to pass on the proof offered by Commander Robert E. Peary to show that Dr. Cook did not reach the pole. The statement will be made public in a few days.

The following resolution was adopted by the officers of the club: That the Peary Arctic club cordially welcomes home Commander Robert E. Peary, U. S. N., and congratulates him upon the attainment, April 6, 1909, of the north pole, crown of years of arduous arctic work, of devotion to duty, and loyalty to country, and invites him to honor it with

WELCOMED TO WASHINGTON.

Washington, Oct. 4.—"This is the home of the American flag which you carried to the north pole," was the expression of a recognition given Dr. Frederick A. Cook by H. B. W. MacFarland, president of the district board of commissioners, in officially welcoming the explorer at the municipal building today in the presence of a crowd that taxed its capacity.

"President Taft, Admiral Dewey, Gen. Greeley and Admiral Schley and other distinguished residents of Washington have individually expressed their appreciation of your great achievement," said the commissioner.

"It is fitting that the entire national capital, through its executive government, should give you a hearty welcome and cordial congratulations."

Dr. Cook was given an ovation when he arrived at the municipal building, and when he arose to respond to the commissioners' tribute, he was greeted with prolonged cheers.

"I fail to find words to suit my appreciation of your kindness," Dr. Cook said. "I am a man of few words and I can only say I thank you."

The explorer then stood in the center of the room, beside Commissioner MacFarland and Jordan, and was given a hearty handclasp by the hundreds who passed in line.

Vienna, Oct. 4.—Albert Pultzer, a brother of Joseph Pultzer, publisher of the New York World, committed suicide in this city yesterday. It was evident that he made doubly sure of death, for he had first swallowed poison and then, standing in front of a mirror, had sent a bullet from a revolver through his right temple.

An empty poison bottle lay on the table in the room.

MOROCCO'S SULTAN TO UNITED STATES

His Personal Representatives Present Letters to President Taft and Secretary Knox.

GREAT MARK OF FRIENDSHIP

Each Letter Was Wrapped in Figured Silk Scarf, Most Beautifully Embroidered.

Washington, Oct. 4.—Clad in the picturesque white robes and turbans of Morocco, their native country, 854 Lamby Zehiani, first secretary, and 89d Mohammed Ben Aboalan Ben Jelul, a native of Fez, were received at the state department today.

"They came as the personal representatives of the sultan of Morocco at the Hudson-Fulton celebration and to deliver the letters from the sultan to President Taft and Secretary Knox."

The letters presented were wrapped in a figured silk scarf, beautifully embroidered. The sultan of Morocco, upon the invitation of the illustrious and honorable president of the great American nation, the Honorable Philander Chase Knox.

"Praise to the only God. There is no strength or power but in God, the great, the Almighty."

"To the dear, the wise, the statesman, the minister for foreign affairs (secretary of state) of the great American nation, the Honorable Philander Chase Knox."

"We beg to inform your excellency that our master, the Prince of Belvoir, the Sultan of Morocco, upon the invitation of the illustrious and honorable president of your great nation, regarding who will be officially sent to represent this holy empire on occasion of the two great celebrations, which will be held in New York, will be sent in answer to the kind and courteous invitation the servant of his majesty, an majesty, styled by God, the Felik, the scribe, the wise, the learned, the famous Felik, the late Sid Mohammed Sanhaji, who was one of the victors of our master, the great master, the great king, the late Sultan Moulay Hassan, may God have mercy upon his soul, being accompanied by the servant of his majesty, the Amin, the wise, the learned, the famous Felik, the scribe, the wise, the learned, the famous Felik, the late Sid Mohammed Ben Aboalan Ben Jelul."
