ELKHORN MINING DISTRICT.

Nelson Group is Showing Up Well Under Development.

The indications are very favorable for making a splendid mine of the Nel-son group in the Elkhorn district, says the Park City Miner. A visit to the property Sunday showed all hands hard at work developing the property, erect-ing new buildings, etc. There are two shifts at work in the tunnel which is being driven to connect with and drain the shaft. Fair progress is being made and only about 100 feet of work remain done, which it is estim finished in something less than six eks. There is a nice vein of ore i shaft from 18 inches to three feet weeks. thickness and assaying 40 per cent lead 30 oz. silver and 810 in gold. This could not be successfully worked without the aid of comparatively expensive machinery owing to the water in the shaft; hence the tunnel is being driven to drain off the water and thus permit drifting on the vein from the bottom of the shaft. In running the tunnel, a vein, apparently separate and distinct from the one in the shaft, was encountered, and about 125 sacks of ore were taken out, carrying from 17 to 30 recent copper, \$9 to \$10 gold, and 7 to 10 per cent lead. There has been no exploring done on this ledge and only such ore was taken out as it was necessary to remove in order to con-tinue the tunnel. The ledge was cut at an angle and ran with the tunnel a short distance, gradually dipping away to the unrtheast to the northeast. As no drifting or cross-cutting was done, it is not known how wide this ledge is but that it will
