From the committee's report of the widows' relief fund of Almy, it appears that there is barely sufficient money on hand to meet the requirements of the widows and their families for the present month. I understand that ten of the families of the sufferers of the late Almy disaster have immigrated down into the Utah settlements, which still leaves forty families in this district depending upon charitable relief. Mr. John W. Sammon, clerk of the Third district court of Evanston, who has up to this conducted their case, is making laudable and far-reaching efforts to reimburse the exhausted fund, and the widows are sending him all the timely aid they can under the circumstances. The immediate effort in this locality is to get up a grand masquerade ball in the Temple of Honor hall, Almy, on Friday, the 22nd inst., and a second ball for them at Evanston on the 27th inst., price to each per couple one dollar and fifty cents.

Mr. Sammon, we understand, has written to a large number of influential gentlemen in the Eastern states soliciting aid in behalf of the widows and their children, and is full of hope that the generous citizens of the West will respond to the invitation and aid their efforts, if only with a dollar each. But one ticket was in the field in Willard City for municipal positions, the count on which showed the following result: Mayor, S. N. Cook, 62 votes; Recorder, J. S. Perry, 63 votes; Treasurer, Elias Williams, 63 votes; Marshal, M. Erickson, 60 votes; Justice of the Peace, A. Ward, 63 votes; Councilmen, H. H. Cordon, 62; H. Call, 60; James Dalton, 63; O. A. Wells, 63 and Byron Barker Sr., 64.

In Bear River City O. C. Johnson was the only candidate for Mayor and received the total vote of the city, numbering 67. The councilmanic contest resulted as follows: Jacob Hansen 65 votes; J. P. Holmsten, 40 votes; Nels Iverson, 40 votes; Ole Hanson, 36 votes; Peter Mortensen, 30 votes; Lars F. Johnson, 27 votes, and O. J. Olsen, 26 votes. The first named five were the victors.

The western portion of Vancouver Island was shaken by an earthquake on Monday last. It was the most distinct shock ever felt in the northern country and caused consternation among the hundreds of Indians who inhabit that part of the island. All the villages were badly shaken up, but the huts being low, no serious damage resulted. The Indians were badly frightened and rushed down to the beach, yelling and screaming, while the women crouched down in terror wailing funeral dirges. The old men seemed to forget the teachings of the missionaries and made preparations to receive the departed members of the tribe, thinking the day of resurrection had come. Guns were fired in the air and the cane beaten.
