They, too, trace their origin from the Babylonian cap tivity, for, according to a tradition still possessed amongst them, their ancestors settled in Persia in the time of Neouchadnezzar, and did not respond to the appeal of Ezra to return to Palestine. Their mode of life resembles that of the Persians in general. They hold the beard in high esteem, and wear long flowing robes They had several synagogues, and obtain Scrolls of the Law from Bagdad. 



UBIQUITY OF THE JEWISH
