The opinion is wide spread that the San Domingo commissioners report will go in at the present session. the Official dispatches received at navy department from the commander of the Tennessee, contain nothing not already telegraphed. They relate prindipaliy to the movements of the Ten-sease and other U. S. vessels on the North Atlantic. The commissioners report in general terms, that the whole strongly opposed to the establishment of our flag on that Island. Speaker Blaine and General Butler, Senators Spencer and Tigener, of Texas, and other Congressmen, intend to spend the summer in Europe and will leave soon after the close of the session. The Attorney General, Chamberlain, of South Carolina, has arrived here. He is the bearer of a letter from Governor Scott, of that State, making a formal request for troops and aid to enforce the laws. Chamberlain says that in some districts of the State it has become impossible to serve civil process. The civil authorities are unable, by reason of the Ku Klux organization, to enforce the laws. Governor Scott requests a regiment of cavalry, owing to the peculiar manner in which the Ku Klux operate, infantry is not as efficient as cavalry. During the sessions of the high commission the past week, the relation of the two countries to each other have been considered, in a general way; with a view to seeing what concessions might be made by either side before any particular point of dispute shall be taken up for settlement. The impression, which prevailed at first, that England was prepared to offer the olive branch,

and that mere quibbles would be dis-carded for a candid and a frank avowal of the wronge committed and the dam-ages to be adjusted, has given place to a fear that England is not disposed to make any magnanimous concessions, and that, if any arrangements are entered into, for settlement of the pending questions, it would be on the basis of an equivalent. The commissioners seem to incline rather to the plan of purchasing the right of our fisheries, to fish freely in Canadian waters, with-out restriction. That is looked upon as an easy made settlement. On the other part there is a certain popular sentiment against commencing the adjustment of our differences with England; for our agreeing to pay England a con-siderable sum for the right to fish for ever, in the Canadian waters, would not be popular with our people. It is hoped, however, that the commission, after a thorough consideration of the subject, may arrive at some solution which will

I can bear my testimony, without fear of successful contradiction, that the earth still lives, for I have experienced the effects of its movements in a most sensitive manner. I have had shaking in my youth, when unruly, but nothing to compare with the one I underwent on Sunday night; and had I not previously been in a horizontal position, asleep, I should undoubtedly have been forced into that position by the shock of an earthquake which, as before stated, occurred last Sunday ever felt on the Sandwich islands within the last fifty years. The shock last-ed between fifty and sixty seconds, the quake continuing for some time after. There were two others during the same aight, but so light that only a few perins felt it, who were unable to sleep. wo others again occurred on Monday night following, which were also light. No damage was sustained at Laie more than the levelfing of some stone wall. Brother Hawkins was aroused

from his pesceful slumbers, made an effort to get out doors to stop his house, which, was apparently skedaddling off over the rock, but failed to effect his exit until the shock ceased. Dishes tried strength with each other, chairs danced, bedsteads rocked, women fainted, some prayed thinking the day

to the foundation.

On my way from Laie to Honolulu I discovered that a portion of the stone church at Kaneohe was thrown down, while immense quantities of rock had

been hurled from overhanging preci-pices into the road an the pall. In Honolulu the walls of some of the

most prominent brick and stone buildings were considerably damaged. Quantitles of earthen ware were thrown from abelves and oupboards and broken. The islands of Molokal, Kauai, Mani and Lahsina suffered considerable loss. Buildings were much fractured and stone walls thrown down.
