HEALTH OF THE CITY.

Of 46 births in this city last week 80 were hoys and 16 girls. There were 21 deaths recorded, 13 of which were males and eight females. Contagious mates and eight remains. Contagious and infectious diseases to the number of 26 ware reported during the week, consisting of five cases of smallpox, three cases of scarlet fever, two of diphtheria, 12 of whoopingcough, one of measles, one of chickenpox and two of fuberchlosis.
