By Denver Telegraph. A Prisoner Escapes. Natchez, Sept. 27, 10 a.m.

Denver News, Salt Lake.—One J. R. Smith, a prisoner, committed from Tinto, to await his trial for murder, at the next session of the district court, to be held at Tinto, broke from the Sheriff's cell, last night, by digging through the wall. He must have been assisted by persons on the outside, who furnished tools. His description is as follows:

Height about six feet, built slender and trim, complexion light, light curly hair, blue eyes, and he had a scar on his temple. He is a native of Virginia, near Richmond. The officers are notified to be on the look-out for him.

DIXIE ITEMS.—"Ahole!" writing from St. George, under date of the 18th instant, says:

"Since my last the people of Dixie have been engaged in drying fruit and making wine. The Spring anticipations in this direction will not be fully realized, on account of the excessive dry season.

The walls of our magnificent Tabernacle are now ready to receive the beams. The set gable and roof are now up about eight feet above the square, the appearance of which is becoming quite imposing.

There are still about sixty Navajos in the settlements east of here, causing the brethren to keep up a vigilant guard on their stock, which consists of a large number of horses, mules, and cattle, upon their time and patience. The guard, however, is absolutely necessary as those of the Navajo race are not animals to be trusted. The band of forty horse-traders for and stolen by them lately at Kanab was, I understand, composed of wild, untamed animals, yet within half an hour the red-skins were seen to be on the ground and were on their backs flying over the plains in every direction.

DETERMINED UNPLEASANT.—If this has not been a decidedly unpleasant, blustery, dusty, partly, conserving, uncomfortable sort of a day, then we will not say so. But it appears to be getting ready for the equinoctial or some other storm. No rain by and by, and their mud will be plentiful and cheap.

CALL.—We had a pleasant call to-day from Elder W. C. Spinks, the Church Migration Agent of New York. He left this city for that place on the 21st of May. He is well and hearty, having had better health this season than for any period since his boyhood. He informs us that matters connected with the year went, relation have gone along agreeably and smoothly, and the emigrants have been remarkably healthy, only a few deaths having occurred. Including the company in charge of Elder John J. Bush, which is expected to get on this evening, about 1,300 souls have immigrated to the present season. The next company will leave Liverpool on the 15th of October, and is expected to arrive in New York, about the 30th of that month. This is probable, but not certain, that there will be still another company after that.

Brother Staines will leave again for New York on or about Oct. 10th, for the purpose of winding up the migration business for the season.
