The very limited supply at this Post of stores of all kinds will render it impossible to make any further issue to citizens. The necessity for this order is imperative, and citizens should not make application, which, if responded to, would entail privation and suffering on the garrison. It is hoped that great publicity will be given to this order so that citizens leaving Salt Lake for the Sweetwater mines, and elsewhere, may not expect to receive supplies at Fort Bridger from the Government. In order that the public may be fully advised it is stated that the supplies were furnished on an estimate of two hundred men, while the addition of a company to the garrison has increased the force to the neighborhood of three hundred.
