A Progressive Firm.—In taking a walk through the establishment of Solomon Brothers & Gold we were surprised to find these gentlemen doing so large a business as they are conducting nearly fifty hands being constantly employed on the premises. Besides the hand labor the establishment has in use a considerable amount of machinery of various kinds.

The firm has had a steady year, rapid growth, and commenced office with the co-partnership of Alfred James and William Solomon, in 1873, when their operations were confined almost exclusively to the work, their goods being all purchased by Z. C. M. I. Subsequently William withdrew and settled in Arizona. The two brothers continued in this line until 1880, when Z. C. M. I. commenced to make boots and shoes. Solomon Brothers were then joined by Cyrus E. Gold, and the establishment has been rapidly increasing in the number of lines made, including a large range of cloths. Their business has been mostly retail, but they are now opening up to some extent in a wholesale way. So great has been the preference for home-made goods over imported that the only lines they carry in the latter are ladies' slippers and infants' wear.

In the various classes manufactured Solomon Brothers & Gold now produce between 500 and 600 pairs weekly, and the trade continues to increase. In addition to the establishment on Main Street in this city, they have a branch store in Ogden.

Death of Dr. F. D. Benedict.—The fact that Dr. F. D. Benedict could not survive the severe illness from which he had for some time been suffering was realized at eight o'clock last night, when he breathed his last, surrounded by a number of his loving relatives and friends. We unite with the wide feeling of sympathy that is entertained for the bereaved in the blow they have sustained.

Francis Denton Benedict was the son of Francis K. and Emeline Benedict. He was born December 27th, 1849, at South Canaan, Connecticut. He took a course in the medical department of the University of the City of New York, at which he graduated with distinction with the class of 1869. Before graduating, however, he took a special course in classics.

He came, in company with his brother, Dr. J. M. Benedict, to this city on March 27th, 1870, and has resided here ever since. On April 23rd, 1873, he was married to Miss Chloe, daughter of the late President Joseph Young. He was an able physician and surgeon and had an extensive practice. His natural disposition was kindly and obliging, and it is indeed sad that one so young and intelligent should be taken away at a time when the most useful portion of his career should be at its beginning.

The funeral services will be held at the late residence of the deceased at 12 m. on Sunday, May 14th. Friends of the family are invited.

A New Town.—Yesterday we had the pleasure of meeting with Bishop Wm. H. Branch, of Mesquite, Lincoln Co., Nevada. The snug little town is only two years old and has eighteen families. About 200 acres of land is now in small grain, which is headed out and harvesting will begin inside of three weeks from date. Fifty acres of land is in lucern, the first crop, of the season, of which has already been cut. The ditch, which conveys the waters of the Rio Virgin upon the land is seven miles long and works to a charm. The location of the place is 45 miles west of St. George. A ready market is found for all kinds of farm produce, grain fetching from 3 to 5 cents a pound on the spot, but the settlement being new, money is somewhat scarce. Bishop Branch will stay in the north a few months, working at his trade—plasterer—to get cash to pay for his land.

Improving It.—The city authorities have commenced the work of improving that part of Arsenal Hill which is in close proximity to the objectionable excavation made for gravel. The street on the west side of the Arsenal Block is being graded, leaving the adjacent lots considerably above its level. The next thing will be to grade the lots down to the street line and throw the dirt to the street or the unsightly hole over which the people of the neighborhood have been so much exercised.

It is believed that he took it to produce sleep, but not knowing its full power, took an overdose, which resulted in death. He was 72 years of age.
