

FRAGMENTS.

CHASED WITH COMMITTING FELONY-ous homicide. FOR WHICH RAYMOND IS HELD TO ANSWER.

The preliminary examination of Frank F. Raymond, charged with killing H. J. O'Brien, on Friday evening last, at the "Western" saloon, was commenced before Judge Lacey yesterday afternoon at three o'clock. The people were represented by County Attorney Murphy and Assistant Attorney Richter. The prisoner was defended by Judge Powers.

THE PRISONER MET HIS ATTORNEY, with the utmost composure, not betraying the slightest concern over the fact that he had committed the probable outcome of the case now in the hands of the law.

He chatted freely with Judge Powers, and made frequent suggestions. When the witness testified that an employee of the Union Ferry Company named H. J. O'Brien, the deceased, was a common name called "Mickey," was at Raymond and Johnson's saloon on Friday night last, I heard Raymond speak to O'Brien; I saw Raymond draw a revolver from under his clothes and fire at O'Brien while at the bar.

Dr. Pinfinkert testified-I was called O'Brien after the shooting. I found three wounds in the chest and other in the abdomen, either of which was fatal. He died at St. Luke's hospital on Friday afternoon. Raymond's attorney asked me to state to the jury that I was not certain of the cause of O'Brien's death.

James Hecney testified-I kept a hotel near the Rio Grande Western depot. I was called by the name of the deceased, I saw him in the saloon on Friday night last. He was shot by Raymond while at the bar.

Probate Court. The following matters came before the Probate Court yesterday: Estate of James Robbins; annual account heard and allowed; petition for sale of mining property and report of executor on compromise of certain claims made and approved.

He was badly hurt. Joseph Keeley, a deaf and dumb boy, was run over by a street car on Second South Street, a short distance east of Main, about 6 o'clock last night, and severely injured. He was standing on the track when the car came from the east.

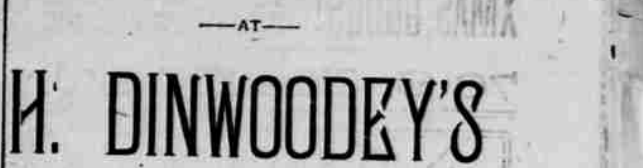
