LOCAL BRIEFS.

Children under 17 will not be admitted to the formal opening of the Y. M. C. A. next Tuesday afternoon and evening, but another date will be set for their convenience. No cards of admission are required for attendance on the opening.

The two batteries of artillery stationed at Fort Douglas will leave on the 15th inst. for Strawberry valley to engage in target practice. The flag will be displayed at half mast until the 13th inst., out of respect to the late Secretary of State.

No definite action was taken by the county board of health yesterday afternoon in regard to improving the sanitary condition of Salt Lake and West All. The weather was thoroughly discussed and it is probable that the board will wait both places before adopting any stringent measures.

Judge Whipple yesterday fined Gust Skjeld \$5 for contempt of court. Skjeld has been summoned before the court on supplementary proceedings and failed to appear at the appointed time. He said that he was sick and could not attend court, but he was fined \$5 to cover the cost of the proceedings.

George Winters, aged 12, was thrown from a wagon in which he was riding near the Short Line depot yesterday afternoon, the horses having become frightened by a locomotive. Winters' scalp was badly gashed, and he was taken to his home at 631 west South Temple street, while Officer Davies caught the horses.

A team belonging to the Nance Mercantile company of Quantaville ran away yesterday afternoon, at 7:15, South and Main streets, and did not reach Third East street when C. W. O'Neill grabbed the horse and one of the horses, jumping on his back, stopped the runaways just in time to prevent them from running over a group of children playing in the street.

A copy of the articles of incorporation of the Oregon Pharmaceutical company has been sent with the secretary of state. AT THE RESORTS.

According to a morning paper a rare animal has been discovered in Utah, nothing more or less than the Comet, mentioned in the Bible. The paper gravely goes on to state that this animal has for many years been supposed to be practically extinct.

The Comet or Ashokoo, as the Comet of the Bible is technically called, is anything but extinct in semi-tropical countries. It is a timid, harmless creature, quick and lively in its movements and abhors itself in cracks and crannies in the rocks, preferably on the sides of cliffs. It is about 11 inches long and 10 inches high; brownish grey above, white beneath, the thick hair interspersed with long scattered bristles. In South Africa this little animal goes by the name of the klap-dasse, and millions of them inhabit the knolls within a distance of 100 miles of the sea coast.

THIS IS WHAT STARTED IT.

1807-Napoleon Bonaparte and the czar of Russia concluded the peace of Tilsit.

The choice of Ferdinand for the throne which Alexander of Battenberg had been found to be unable to rule was a solution of the troubles of Bulgaria. He never received the sanction of Russia, but Turkey and Austria were induced to help him to rule. Under his rule Bulgaria has prospered and been at peace except for slight internal troubles.

1892-Justice Samuel Blatchford of the United States supreme court died at Newark, R. I.; born 1829.

1899-George Law, capitalist and projector, son of George Law, of Panama fame, and in New York city; born 1843.

1901-Pierre Lorillard, noted tobacconist and millionaire manufacturer, died in New York city; born 1832.
