AMERICAN.

NEW YORK, 10.—The Owl train on the Pennsylvania railroad, due at Jersey City this morning, was boarded by a band of robbers, who robbed and nearly beat to death Thomas Downing, of New York. The conductor and brakemen, who attempted to rescue Downing, were driven away with revolvers, but locked the ruffians in the car, and telegraphed to the police in Jersey City, to be ready at the depot. While the train was running at 30 miles an hour three of the desperadoes escaped by jumping out of the windows. The fourth man was arrested.

PHILADELPHIA, 10.—Charles Stringer was arrested to-day by an agent of the society for the prevention of cruelty to children for placing his grandson upon a hot stove and burning him badly, for assaulting his wife and another grandchild with a hatchet and knife, and for setting fire to his house.

NEW YORK, 11.—The World's Washington special says the order of Secretary Sherman, dismissing clerks from the Treasury Department, so that no more than one of a family shall be employed, has demoralized the whole department, and will prove to be one of the greatest frauds of civil service reform. It is only a pretence to make places for friends of officials, and is openly proclaimed as such on the streets of Washington by republicans. Yesterday two women clerks, who lost their husbands in the war, and who were regarded as competent clerks, were dismissed because they had a brother in the Department. The Secretary, however, has not dismissed his brother, who is collector of internal revenue in Iowa, or called on the Department of Justice to recall his nephew, who is marshal of New Mexico, nor made a raid on his other relations and that of his family who are in office.

The World's London correspondent says, it has been a matter of pretty general notoriety in leading political and commercial circles here that Minister Pierpont has, on many occasions during the past two or three months, endeavored to draw the attention of important English capitalists to the feasibility of organizing a company to construct the long mooted Nicaraguan canal, with one gentleman, at least, a member of Parliament and a banker of unusual ability. Pierpont is understood to have gone so far as to intimate to ex-President Grant that if the position were offered him he would accept the presidency of such a company, provided it were organized by persons competent to guarantee the success of the enterprise. This conversation occurred some weeks before General Grant sailed from Philadelphia, and the matter has been since repeatedly mooted in financial circles. "I think I am justified in saying that Pierpont is so intimate with at least one American capitalist of wealth, a New York gentleman, heretofore prominently identified with several projects for uniting the Atlantic and Pacific oceans by an American canal, stands ready to take hold of the work as soon as it is commenced in England."

A letter from Paraguay says President Gill and his brother were murdered in a most barbarous manner. The President was at home with his family, when he was surprised and killed by a band of assassins, headed by Colonel Gerbura and Commanders Morales and Godey. In subsequent engagements with the troops Gerbert and Morales were made prisoners.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 8.—A Paris correspondent states that the communication which Count Schouvaloff brings to London is not a note in the diplomatic sense, but a letter from Prince Gortschakoff in reply to a letter of Lord Derby, which Count Schouvaloff took with him to St. Petersburg. In his letter Lord Derby drew the attention of Russia to various points where English interests would be affected if Russian action extended so far. They were mentioned in Mr. Crose's speech in Parliament, and are the Suez Canal and Egypt, Constantinople, the Dardanelles and the Persian Gulf. The Prince's letter successively takes up those points and explains that Russia does not intend to interfere with any one of them. Prince Gortschakoff acknowledged

es the great international and commercial importance of the Suez Canal, and gives the most positive assurances that Russia does not intend, in any way, to touch it. Russia, indeed, thinks herself entitled, as a matter of right, to carry the war into Egypt, but explains that any action in that direction has never even been taken into consideration. This is more the case as regards the Persian Gulf. Russia thinks that so important a maritime passage as the Dardanelles must be regulated by international agreement, and not by one power alone.—She disclaims any intention of acquiring Constantinople, though at the same time she could not consent to its possession by any other Christian power. The communication is silent as regards any temporary occupation of Constantinople, which may become necessary and ensue in the course of Russian military achievements. The letter goes on to say that Russia has remained true to her programme in aiming solely at improving the condition of the Christians in Turkey, which can only be done by the coercion of the Porte. As soon as Russia has achieved this she will fall back on the resolutions of the Constantinople Conference, and contend for such guarantees as will ensure the efficiency of reforms, asking the powers to take up the thread where it was broken by the dissolution of the conference.
