A band of armed peasants entered Canea last night and occupied the fortress determined to prevent the carrying out of the powers' command for the romoval of the Greek flag. Numbers of deputies arrived in Canea during the evening to attend parliament.

SITUATION DISTURBING.

London, Aug. 15.—A peaceful sclu-on of the Cretan situation appeared ractically to have been secured last through the intervention of the four protecting powers. The situa-tion is again disturbing, however, and tion is again disturbing, however, and a naval demonstration will be made. The Young Turkey party plainly mistrusts the present Turkish minis-try and fears that Turkey will lose suzeranity of Crete, as she has lost that of Bulgaria. This feeling has led to a strong movement among the Albanians against the Turkish government and to a serious boycott ngainst Greek trade. Outside of casting their votes, the president bolieves that census supervi-sors and enumerators should keep clear of anything that savors of politics, na-tional, state or local. Mr. Taft says that in appointing cen-sus supervisors it has been found nec-essary to select men recommended by sentors and congressmen in their dis-tricts. He says he realizes that this
