Suit Mrs. Julia Parker vs. R. G. W. R'y Co. et al Now on Trial.

Verdict for City in Couch Damage Case - In the Police Court - House Breaker Forfeits His Bond.

Before Judge Rolapp in the Second District court yesterday, the case of Mrs. Julia Parker against the Rio Grande Western, Union Pacific, Southern Pacific Railroad companies and the Ogden Union Depot company was called.

The case was brought by the plaintiff to recover judgment in the sum of \$25,000 alleged to be due for the killing of her husband by the negligence of the defendant companies on April 4, 1900, when he was in the discharge of some duty as a switchman in the Union Pacific company.

BOUNTIFUL.

Annual Meeting of Deseret Live Stock Company. Special Correspondence. Bountiful, Davis Co., Feb. 19.-The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Deseret Live Stock company was held at the company's office at Wood's Cross yesterday afternoon.

The old board of directors, consisting of William Moss, Starns Hatch, James H. Moyle, John K. Nelson, Henry Moss, John H. Moss, M. B. Brown, J. I. Atkinson and O. P. Hatch, were re-elected. It was also the intention to vote to increase the capital stock of the company from \$150,000 to \$200,000 but nothing was done in the matter.

Superintendent William Moss, who has charge of the company's herds, said the prospects were bright for the herds to "pull" through the winter with very little loss. Said the prospect was not so favorable for the sheep as for the wool and mutton this year as last. He pointed out the fact that each succeeding year it becomes more and more difficult to pasture flocks unless one has his own land as the public range is gradually being cut down. His company has secured considerable summer range at Wasatch, Summit county.

Speaking about wild animals he said the coyote was the company's worst enemy. That he believed that animal damaged the sheep about \$20,000 a year and the worst of it, he said, they are increasing faster than the sheep. He added, the management had been to considerable expense to try to kill off the pest but their efforts were not "a bit" in the matter.

The company pays out over \$30,000 a year for help and employs constantly fifty-five hands and double this number during lambing and shearing time. The average wage paid is about \$2.75 per hand per day, being cut down, however, to \$1.50 a day in the winter. It is mostly local so it will be seen that the company is a great benefit to the people of this locality.

With a few exceptions the stock is principally held by local people. It is a small body of stock and is further local benefit that comes from dividends. KANOSH.

Demise of Mrs. Mary M. Anderson, a Faithful Veteran. Special Correspondence. Kanosh, Millard Co., Feb. 19.-Mrs. Mary M. Anderson of this place died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Woodard, in Elsinore, Sevier county, She was born May 17, 1818. She was the wife of the late Hiram Anderson, with whom she embraced the Gospel in the year 1856 in Copenhagen, Denmark, and emigrated to Utah in the year 1862, coming removed to Deseret, and shared in the early struggles of the pioneer settlers in this district. And here the subject of this notice, with a little family upon her hands, filled the measure of her creation, and proved in truth a "helpmeet to man," for her husband was sick and unable to work. She made the ditches to carry the water, which she hoped would provide her loved ones with bread, but the dam went out and all was lost. Then they removed to Meadow, and later took up land which has developed into the beautiful home of today.

Mrs. Anderson has left eight living children, four sons and four daughters, only two of whom were able through absence and sickness to accompany the remains in the long cold journey by vehicle from Elsinore to their last resting place in the private graveyard at Kanosh, near Meadow, by the side of her husband. The funeral services were conducted by Bishop Neil Stewart of Meadow. The speakers were the venerable Bishop Hiram Bennett, Bishop C. Christianson of Kanosh and Elders Boyd and George Crane, all of whom testified to the faithfulness and good works of the deceased. Her four daughters all live with their families in Sevier county, her son Hakan in Arizona, and Albert could not be found by telegram. He is in the vicinity of southern Utah or Arizona engaged in the management of stock, whilst John, the youngest of them all, is doing missionary labor in the State of Indiana.
