GENERAL.

New York, 31.—At the session of the Fenian convention on Sunday, President Savage delivered an address, urging the members to vote for those who were favorable to the Fenian cause, whether Republicans or Democrats. He then insisted upon resigning, and his resignation was accepted. Subsequently the union of the two wings was effected, and they met as one body. A new constitution was adopted. The session lasted till one o'clock this morning.

Columbia, S. C.—The Governor, to-day, issued a circular relative to armed organizations and the introduction of arms into the State. He disapproves both, and calls upon all persons to keep the peace, and says he will exercise all his authority for that purpose.

Atlanta, 31.—The Senate has unanimously passed a resolution authorizing the Governor to issue a proclamation for the disbanding of the army associations, termed negro bands, throughout the State.

New Orleans, 31.—The Senate, to-day, ousted E. T. Jewell, Senator, from the second district of Orleans parish, and installed in his place a mulatto named Pinchback, on the ground that there was a fraud in the election. The witness upon whose testimony the report of the election committee was mainly based, has sworn to an affidavit which was published, declaring that his evidence, given by the election committee, was false from beginning to end, and that he had been influenced by promises of reward.

St. Louis, 1.—The Democrat's Little Rock special says that Governor Clayton has returned from Lewisburg. The insurrection is quieted and the courts are reinstated. The difficulty commenced by the rebels breaking up the court with an armed force, and discharging the Union men. The latter soon collected 100 strong and took up a position in a cotton field and whipped 300 rebels, several of whom are shot and missing; the Union loss, none. Governor Clayton addressed the insurgents, ordering them to disperse; and in the meanwhile the sheriff arrived with a posse 300 strong, when quiet was restored.

Portland, 1.—Senator Fessenden was warmly received here last night by the mass meeting, at which he made a lengthy address in regard to the course, which he said he was forced into, (against his will) in his position as Secretary of the Treasury. He went in, because if he had not done so, it would have been considered a confession of his want of confidence in the ability of Government to go on; and he was in the tightest place he was ever in, except when obliged to vote to acquit the President.

Chicago.—An Omaha dispatch says that the Indians drove off the wood choppers on the south side of the Platte River on Saturday, and set fire to 5,000 cords of wood. Superintendent Denman denies that Red Cloud is coming down from the north; he says hostilities are entirely confined to the Cheyennes, and the Sioux say they will not participate.

A Denver dispatch says that a family named Neff, numbering nine persons, residing on Jennings' Camp Road, were found murdered last Saturday.

The Express says that warrants have been issued by Commissioner Guzman for the arrest of prominent revenue officials, at the instance of Solicitor Binckley, of the Treasury Department. Ex-Collector Smyth is in custody, under examination.

Montpelier.—The election has resulted in the success of the Republican State ticket by a largely increased majority over last year. The Senate, are unanimously Republican; the House is nearly so. The returns from one-third of the State indicate a Republican majority of 27,000 for Governor; good judges place it as high as 30,000. The vote is the heaviest polled since 1840.

Washington specials say that warrants have been issued at New York for the arrest of commissioner Rollins, deputy collector Harlan, Thomas E. Smith, collector Murry and late inspector Haggerty on a charge of defrauding the revenue. They will be examined before commissioner Gutman at the Astor House. Brinckley, who has been absent without leave from the department for some time, is said to be at the bottom of this proceeding, and has done it in order to furnish the President with a pretext for Rollins' suspension. The Republican Journals believe the whole affair is a conspiracy against Rollins.
