Two officers from Chicago, two from St. Louis, two from Portland and several from San Francisco will outer the city unheralded and remain here until after the vessels have de-parted. These non will not be known in the members of the detective and patrol force. The heads of the de-portments will meet them and will instruct them to work through the east First street and San Pedro street saloons and through the heart of the tenderloin. Any man they meet who they know has been engaged in shady dealings in eastern or northern cities will be sent to jail on suspicion.
