Resolved, that this assembly earnestly invokes the continued and persistent eff. ris of all executive officials for the maintenance and execution of this law, and hereby so appeals to patriotic Christian men and women to use their united influence in support of their united influence in support of the public sentiment now formlated into legal enactment, which has exposed the pretense of this monstrous practice to be a religious observance, and which justly holds it to be the championship with other vices which are contemplated with the abhorence of mankind.
