Vartianan, which was found yesterday doubled with the head strapped to the knees, fles in the morgue, positively identified, according to the police, but without clue other than those already provided in the fluding of the body.

The chemical examination of the organs of the dead priest is progressing and until the result of this is known the police will not say positively whether or not Father Vartianan was killed by drugs before he was placed in the trunk. The police believe robbery

was the motive for the crime. The suggestion that the pricat was killed as a result of disclosures of a plot to seize the throne of Servin were not credited by the bishop in charge of the local field

today. The house on Tenth avenue and the room where the body was found have been under investigation and there are many circumstances which lead the de-tectives to think that either may have been the scene of the crime. The con-nection of a secret society with the killing has remained more or less of a suggestion.

killing has remained there is a suggestion. Capt. Stephen O'Brien, of the Thirty-seventh street precinct, said at mid-night that the movements of the priest had been traced up to noon on last Wednesday when he was seen to enter the house at 33 West Thirty-seventh street. No one saw Father Varthanan after this, so far as can be ascortained. Capt. O'Brien expressed the belief that the murder was committed in the room where the trunk was found, and said that the contents of this trunk, removed before the murder, were found before before the murder, were found in bureau drawers and scattered about

In bureau drawers and scattered about the room. Scores of detectives and policemen are scouring the city in an effort to locate the men who are suspected of compli-city in the murder of Rev. Father Kas-par, the Armenian priest whose body was found in a trunk in a West Thirty-seventh street tenement house yester-day. Every settlement in this and surrounding cities of peoples having anything in common with Armenians is closely watched and the railroad

surrounding cities of peoples having anything in common with Armenians is closely watched and the railroad stations and steamship plers are under close observation. The men sought by the police are Ermeylan and Barmorevion Sarki and Paul Saristian. It was in the room of the Sarki brothers that the trunk con-taining the priest's body was found. They disappeared several days ago and the officers believe that they may have left the country or returned to Chicago, from whence they came. Although several theories have been advanced to account for the murder, the police still believe robbery was the real motive. One of the theories is that the dead priest was about to ex-pose a conspiracy to seize the Servian throne, which is alleged to have been arranged in this country with an al-leged prince of the blood as the lead-ing figure.
