

KASPAR MURDER STILL A MYSTERY

Body at the Morgue Positively Identified But There Are No Clues.

DETECTIVES SCOURING CITY.

Police Dismiss the Theory That Priest Was Killed in Connection With a Serbian Throne Plot.

New York, May 27.—The body of the Armenian priest, Rev. Father Kaspar Vartanian, which was found yesterday doubled with the head strapped to the knees, lies in the morgue, positively identified, according to the police, but without clue other than those already provided in the finding of the body.

The chemical examination of the organs of the dead priest is progressing and until the result of this is known the police will not say positively whether or not Father Vartanian was killed by drugs before he was placed in the trunk. The police believe robbery was the motive for the crime. The suggestion that the priest was killed as a result of disclosures of a plot to seize the throne of Serbia were not credited by the bishop in charge of the local field today.

The house on Tenth avenue and the room where the body was found have been under investigation and there are many circumstances which lead the detectives to think that either may have been the scene of the crime. The conclusion of a secret society with the killing has remained more or less of a suggestion.

Capt. Stephen O'Brien, of the Thirty-seventh street precinct, said at midnight that the movements of the priest had been traced up to noon on last Wednesday when he was seen to enter the house at 23 West Thirty-seventh street. No one saw Father Vartanian after this, so far as can be ascertained. Capt. O'Brien expressed the belief that the murder was committed in the room where the trunk was found, and said that the contents of this trunk, removed before the murder, were found in bureau drawers and scattered about the room.

Scores of detectives and policemen are scouring the city in an effort to locate the men who are suspected of complicity in the murder of Rev. Father Kaspar, the Armenian priest whose body was found in a trunk in a West Thirty-seventh street tenement house yesterday. Every settlement in this and surrounding cities of peoples having anything in common with Armenians is closely watched and the railroad stations and steamship piers are under close observation.

The men sought by the police are Ermenyan and Barmorevian Sarki and Paul Sarkian. It was in the room of the Sarki brothers that the trunk containing the priest's body was found. They disappeared several days ago and the officers believe that they may have left the country or returned to Chicago, from whence they came.

Although several theories have been advanced to account for the murder, the police still believe robbery was the real motive. One of the theories is that the dead priest was about to depose a conspiracy to seize the Serbian throne, which is alleged to have been arranged in this country with an alleged prince of the blood as the leading figure. It is said that Father Kaspar became a confidant of one of the conspirators and had determined to make a complete exposure.

Another story declared that the men are suspected to be agents of a Bulgarian committee who are seeking to overthrow the influence of the Greeks in Macedonia. The priest, according to this story, learned of their identity and they killed him in fear that he would expose their plans. The police, however, note that all the valuables the priest was known to have carried had been removed from the clothing found in the trunk with his body. It is known that the priest carried considerable money of his own and that he also usually had a considerable amount which he collected from day to day in his rounds of the Armenian settlement in this city for the support of the par-

CHICAGO SUSPECT RELEASED.

Chicago, May 27.—John Kermoyan, who was arrested here today on suspicion of complicity in the murder of Father Kaspar Vartanian, the Armenian priest whose body was found in a trunk in a tenement house in New York City, was released tonight after having satisfied the police authorities that he had nothing to do with the murder. Kermoyan, when arrested was thought to be one of the two Ermenyan brothers who formerly kept a restaurant at 1202 Halsted street, and whose business card together with a meal ticket, was found in the trunk with the body.

The European arrested today is a cousin of the Ermenyan brothers.

MOTIVE FOR MURDER.

New York, May 27.—Notwithstanding that the motive for the murder of Father Kaspar Vartanian, the Armenian priest whose body was found on Sunday in a trunk in a West Thirty-seventh street house is not yet clear, some facts have been learned which may dispel all doubts as to why the priest was slain. Father Kaspar, according to some witnesses who have been found, was a politician as well as a clergyman, and was identified with an Armenian secret revolutionary society in this city. It appears further that recently the revolutionaries in the local Armenian colony split and that much bad blood was engendered by the division.

BROWNSVILLE HEARING.

Maj. Blockson Couldn't Tell Difference Between Bullets.

Washington, May 27.—Maj. Blockson of the inspector general's department of the army testified today before the senate committee on military affairs concerning the investigation of the affair at Brownsville, Tex. He described in detail the examination which he made of the houses given into, and in a number of instances gave the opinion that the shots had been fired from the barracks.

On cross-examination he admitted that he had formed the opinion upon his arrival that the negro soldiers were guilty of making the raid, but said the careful investigation made did not change his first idea.

Maj. Blockson testified that there is a decided difference between the bullet used in a Krag-Jorgensen cartridge and the bullet used in the Springfield cartridge. Senator Foraker took a Krag and a Springfield cartridge in his hand, hiding all except the bullets, and asked the witness to select the Springfield. He selected the Krag instead. It was then shown that there is no difference in the bullets.

ROBBED OF HER JEWELS.

New York, May 27.—Mrs. Virginia Scatena, wife of a San Francisco landman, who arrived in this city upon the steamer Celtic from Europe, reported that a jeweled dagger pin valued at \$1,300, was stolen from her stateroom during the voyage. Mrs. Scatena left the pin sticking in her coat when she went down to luncheon last Friday. When she returned it was missing, and a search of the ship failed to reveal any trace of it.

THE MURDERERS OF TONY SILVA

Preston is Given Twenty-five Years and Smith a Term of Ten Years.

PRESTON DID THE SHOOTING.

Smith Was the Leading Agitator of The Industrial Workers of the World in Goldfield.

Goldfield, Nev., May 27.—Judge Langston today overruled the motion for a new trial in the case of Preston and Smith, convicted of the murder of John or Tony Silva, and sentenced them to the penitentiary. Preston for a term of 25 years and Smith for a term of 10 years. Preston was the man who did the shooting. He was the picket stationed at Silva's restaurant during the boycott, and Smith was the walking delegate who sent Preston to the station.

A conversation was overheard between Preston and Smith wherein the former said he would go to Silva's place and get him, meaning killing him. Smith replied that he would wait for 10 minutes until he could get out of the way and thus avoid suspicion. Smith was the leading agitator of the Industrial Workers of the World.

The verdict permitted a life sentence for Preston, who was convicted of murder in the second degree and 10 years for Smith, who was convicted of voluntary manslaughter. Smith got the limit. The motion for a change of venue for St. John and others also indicted for conspiracy in the Silva murder, will be argued tomorrow. Smith was convicted of conspiracy upon the same evidence that will be adduced against St. John.

MRS. M'KINLEY DIED AS A CHILD GOING TO SLEEP.

Washington, May 27.—Surgeon Gen. Rixey returned today from Canton, where he has been summoned by the illness of Mrs. McKinley. He gave the following account of the passing of Mrs. McKinley.

"Mrs. McKinley recognized Secy. Corley and myself on our arrival Friday morning, although she had been in a semi-comatose condition for 24 hours, attended by Drs. Fortman and Eymann, her local physicians and friends. Her face brightened and with one of those sweet smiles for which she was noted, she spoke a few words of welcome and gratitude that we had come to her. After this, up to the last, she was aroused with difficulty, but seemed to recognize the voice of Justice and Mrs. Day Saturday morning. "Yes," she died as a child going to sleep, quietly, peacefully, without a struggle, and as she breathed the last few breaths of this life, the expression of her face changed, the lines of pain and sorrow seemed to leave it, and she looked as she must have appeared in her girlhood, before the physical affliction from which she suffered for 24 years came to her in her early motherhood."

JAPS MAKE MURDEROUS ASSAULT ON TWO MEN.

San Francisco, May 27.—For a murderous assault committed by Japanese armed with knives on Horace Hazell, a young man, and Edward Merrivether, an electrician, at an early hour this morning, the police have taken M. Tugimova, Niki Keipiro and S. Hamada into custody. They are held in custody pending the outcome of the victims' injuries.

Hazell and Merrivether were on their way to Merrivether's home, when they encountered a bunch of Japanese. One of the Japs asked, "Where the — are you going?" Without waiting for an answer knives were drawn by the Japanese, who attacked the men and did not desist in their assault until a policeman approached the scene. Merrivether and Hazell were removed to the central emergency hospital and were later removed to private institutions, where both are now said to be in a serious condition.

Detectives Ryan and O'Dea were detailed on the case and the three men in custody were due to their investigation of the crime. The theory of the detectives is that the Japanese believed Merrivether to be a spy, and that he was arrested a week ago for battery on A. Ishanada. His name is Richard Merrivether and his case is set for trial in Judge Cabanis' court next Wednesday.

MURDERED HIS MOTHER.

Then William McKie Took His Own Life.

Kalamazoo, Mich., May 27.—Word was received here this afternoon that William McKie, a local druggist, who disappeared from Kalamazoo Thursday, had murdered his mother and then committed suicide in Blight, Ont. Sunday night. McKie was in financial difficulties. It is said being involved in a non-paying mining venture.

KILLED RESISTING ARREST.

Tacoma, Wash., May 27.—William S. Gerkins was shot and killed at Toledo, Wash., yesterday afternoon, in a fight with Thomas H. O'Connor, who had been deputized to arrest him. Gerkins had escaped from Special Deputy Packman at Muloch, who was bringing Gerkins to jail at Chehalis, for killing a cow.

COPPER QUEEN'S TAXES.

Washington, May 27.—In the case of the Copper Queen Consolidated Mining company vs the territorial board of equalization of Arizona, the supreme court of the United States upheld the right of the board to increase taxes.

TWO-CENT RATE IN ILLINOIS.

Springfield, Ill., May 27.—The two-cent passenger fare bill was approved by Gov. Denson tonight. This bill makes a straight two-cent a mile limit on all railroads in Illinois.

BOY KILLS A BOY.

Spokane, Wash., May 27.—Temple King, aged 15, died this morning as the result of being struck behind the ear by a sharp rock hurled by Westall Ramabotton, aged 11. The two boys quarreled Sunday afternoon. Later Mrs. Ramabotton called Westall and when he refused to come she asked Temple to bring him. Temple went after the younger boy who hurled a rock inflicting fatal injuries.

MICHIGAN SENATE FAVORS ROOSEVELT'S RE-ELECTION.

Lansing, Mich., May 27.—The state senate tonight passed a concurrent resolution demanding that President Roosevelt be re-elected for a "second elective" term as president of the United States. The resolution was passed without opposition, except for a brief suggestion from Senator Fuller that a national convention was the proper place for such a resolution.

PEOPLE WITH CHILDREN.

Los Angeles Will Make it Misdemeanor To Refuse to Rent to Them.

Los Angeles, Cal., May 27.—The city council today, by unanimous vote, instructed the city attorney to prepare an ordinance which will be passed at the next meeting, making it a misdemeanor, punishable by fine or imprisonment, or both, for a landlord to refuse to rent property to a tenant because the latter is possessed of children. The council also directed the clerk to send a copy of the ordinance to President Roosevelt. Members of the council were doubtful of the constitutionality of the act, but decided to enact the law and let the courts to pass upon its constitutionality.

A GOLDFIELD HOLD-UP.

Supt. O. J. Buchanan, Robbed and Probably Fatally Wounded.

Goldfield, Nev., May 27.—O. J. Buchanan, superintendent of the Florence Goldfield Red King Leasing company, operating the Gaizing lease, was held up and robbed while returning to town from the mines late last night. He was severely if not fatally beaten.

ENGINEER GRUNSKY RESIGNS.

Washington, May 27.—C. E. Grunsky, consulting engineer in the United States reclamation service, will shortly resign to attend private business. He was formerly a member of the Ishman canal commission.

"SILENT" SMITH'S WILL.

Goshen, N. Y., May 27.—The will of James Henry Smith, the multi-millionaire, who died in Japan while on a wedding trip around the world, was admitted to probate today.

MULTI-MILLIONAIRES.

Denver, May 28.—The Rocky Mountain News today says: That the federal grand jury now in progress in Denver involves some of the largest corporations in America and that indictments will be returned against men who are ranked as multi-millionaires and captains of industry. Known as well in Wall street as in Colorado, is the latest development in connection with the probing of the grand jury. No less than 120 secret service men are now on headquarters in Denver, this small army of government sleuths having rented a large portion of the fifth floor of an office building, from where they are spreading the net that is tightening about victims in high places. L. C. Wheeler, in the service of the department of justice at Washington, is in charge of the secret service men and he expresses the belief that there will be some startling revelations in the near future.
