

mobocratic law; not for the practice of polygamy, but for believing and daring to assert that God had spoken from the heavens and revealed the gospel anew to man.

Mrs. A. W. Hinkley—I feel it my duty to bear my testimony and protest against any movement to destroy our religious liberties. I have lived in polygamy nearly 24 years, a little more than half my life, trying to obey and keep one of the most holy ordinances that was ever revealed to man.

Speeches were then read by Sisters Adelia Kimball and Eliza Lyman.

Sister Helen M. Callister's speech was read by the secretary. "I know the principle of plural marriage to be a truth, I have lived in polygamy for the last 33 years, and was among the first to enter into that sacred principle, I have shared hunger, poverty, and toil, with my husband's first wife, whom I love as a dear sister. Together we trod the trackless wilds to reach these then sterile valleys. Together we battled the hardships of the 'first year.' Through many trying scenes, ties closer than that of sisterhood bound us together and now that peaceful homes and smiling plenty have succeeded those bitter hardships, these invaders come seeking to spread desolation by sundering these sacred family ties."

Sister Abigail Stevens spoke in strong terms, advocating the principle of polygamy and protesting against the anti-polygamy crusade. Sister Caroline Lyman then read her speech.

The minutes of the mass meeting at Deseret were read by Sister Eliza Wickens.

Song, "The Trumpet of our Freedom," etc., by Sister W. Powell. Sister Emma Jane Bennett then read an address, also one from Ann J. Bennett. Muldah Teeples bore her testimony to the truth of plural marriage. Speeches by Mary A. McBride, Columbia McBride, Hannah L. Fisher and Alice J. Pratt were read by the secretary. Speech by Mrs. R. Anderson.

The doctrine of celestial marriage has been revealed to elevate mankind from their fallen condition socially. The Bible, on which our Christian friends build their religious systems, upholds polygamy and condemns prostitution. I believe in woman's rights, and that polygamy is the only system that insures them to her."

Jean Holbrook said: We know our cause to be just, and that God will help us to defend it if we are faithful. I was born and raised in polygamy and feel proud of my heritage. I have had a very happy life, so far, and hope that my course will be such as will store up treasures for me in heaven.

Speeches were made by Sarah Davis and Emily Ralph. Sister Wilcox bore her testimony to the truth of the principle of plural marriage.

The preamble and resolutions of the ladies of Salt Lake City were read and adopted.

Also Resolved, That we will not fellowship or associate with those in our community who have given aid, and support to the acts and doings of the Gentile ladies of Salt Lake City, by circulating and signing the petition against polygamy.

These were unanimously adopted by all the ladies present.

Minutes of the mass meeting in Scipio were read by Miss F. M. Brown. Eliza Lyman, delegate from Oak Creek, reported for that place. There were also speeches from Mrs. Lizzie Partridge, Ann Ashman, Bird Robison, R. T. Stephenson, Lemira Robison, Elizabeth Thomson, and Mary Black. Many others would have expressed their sentiments had there been time.

Pres. Hinkley, Partridge, and a few other brethren were present as visitors.

WASATCH STAKE CONFERENCE.

The seventh Quarterly Conference of the Wasatch Stake of Zion convened at the Meeting-house, Heber City, at 10 a. m., on the 1st February, 1879.

On the stand were: Pres. A. Hatch and Counselors, the Bishops of the Stake and their Counselors,

presidents of quorums, high council, etc.

After singing and prayer, Pres. Hatch spoke a few words by way of introduction, referring to the favorable circumstances under which we had met, and explaining the object of the Conference.

The several ward bishops made their reports, showing that everything was prospering in their respective Wards; the schools in all the wards were well attended and well taught; Relief Societies, Young Ladies' and Young Men's Mutual Improvement Societies all in active operation.

Pres. J. M. Murdock, of the High Priests quorum, reported his quorum, numbering 100 members throughout the county, average attendance at the monthly meetings about 50 per cent.

On Sunday morning at 10 o'clock the house was filled, seats crowded, standing room all occupied and many could not enter.

Pres. Wm. Cluff from Coalville honored us with a visit and addressed the meeting, contrasting the present and the past, showing the prosperity of the Saints, and hoping that our spiritual improvement might be equally prosperous. Bro. Cluff also spoke briefly at the afternoon session. The sacrament was partaken of and the general Authorities of the Church unanimously sustained, and the Stake authorities sustained without opposition.

The following statistics of the Stake were read, viz. 40 seventies, 91 high priests, 170 elders, 16 priests, 21 teachers, 38 deacons, 1,142 members, 1,516 total officers and members, 864 children under 8 years of age, 2,380 total number of souls. We have in the Stake, between the ages of 6 and 16, 812 children. We have eleven schools in active operation, with 491 pupils, in attendance, also 5 Sabbath Schools with 498 pupils, 89 officers and teachers; Bible and Testament classes 19, Book of Mormon classes 2, Doctrine and Covenant classes 2, Juvenile Instructor classes 3, catechism classes 3, miscellaneous classes 33. Total number of classes 69. Books in library 174. Funds collected \$95.32; disbursed \$74.30; balance \$21.02.

Wasatch County has an area of nearly 15,000 square miles. It has a mountain range of 300 miles in length and 15 miles in width, making 4,500 square miles of timber, consisting of pine, cedar, mahogany, maple, quaking asp, etc. Eighty-five small streams take their rise in the mountains, feeding 15 large streams, all of which terminate in the county, except two. Each of these large streams will sustain on an average 5,000 persons under our existing modes of agriculture. All the streams afford an abundance of fish. There are within the county at least 2,000 square miles of coal land, some of the veins now being worked are from 10 to 20 feet thick (Ashley Fork). There are 9,000 square miles of country well adapted for grazing in summer and winter, sufficient to sustain 100,000 head of stock. Mines of precious metals are now being rapidly developed, and promise to equal, if not surpass, any in the world. Unfortunately, however, nearly three-fourths of the entire country is held as a reservation for the exclusive benefit of about 80 families of Indians. Population of the county about 3,000 whites and 500 Indians; death rate one out of every 120 persons per year. We have no lawyers nor doctors resident in the county. Litigation is almost unknown; but one case during the past 11 years has gone to the district court.

The county government is administered with ability and honesty by the court, who positively refuse any and all persons license to sell spirituous liquors. Consequently no dram shops exist within our borders. The necessity has not arisen since the organization of this Stake of Zion, to call the High Council together for the purpose of adjusting any matter of difficulty. And since the organization of this Stake, the government and management thereof has been satisfactorily and wisely conducted. Our President, Abram Hatch, has successfully endeavored to inspire the brethren with a disposition to cultivate good morals and in every way strive to act for the general good and the building up and glory of Zion.

Our conference passed off pleasantly, a good spirit prevailing. Adjourned till the first Saturday in May, 1879.
