

THE HISTORIC DEVEREUX MANSION.

In the old days when this valley was but sparsely settled and the metropolitan city was but a primitive village, there were many visitors prominent in the world's affairs who came here in their travels. They had to be entertained and it had to be done in the manner to which they were accustomed. This is the house in which most of the entertaining was done—this old "Devereux Mansion," which stands in the center of the block between Second and Third West on South Temple, and which is so familiar to all Salt Lakers for two generations past. No person of any consequence came here in the seventies or eighties who did not visit there, as the guests of William Jennings, one time Mayor of the city and the first millionaire in the state,

The house, which was built so substantially that it is in almost as good condition now as it was at the time the last finishing touch was put on the work, was erected by William Jennings, and was for a number of years the home of himself and family. Devereux was a family name on Mr. Jennings' mother's side, and the family residence in the old country was called the "Devereux House." So when Mr. Jennings built his sumptuous home, it was quite fitting that he should have named is as he did.

No residence erected in this city before or since was built with more stability and beauty. Every wall in the house is of adobe, even the intersecting walls on the interior being made of the solid old gray bricks. The staircases are of oak, made from wagon boxes, which came across the plains. The railings are in black walnut. The graining was done by Morris, and the carving by Ramsey, two famous old figures in the architectural moulding of early Salt Lake homes.

Among the noted visitors who were entertained at the old house in the early days were Lady Franklin and General Grant. Besides these there were any number from Mexico, Japan, men and women with titles. Mrs. William Jennings, who is living with her sister at 56 south, Sixth East, says that she has regretted many times that she did not keep the names of those who stayed at the house, as it would be a very interesting record. Mrs. Jennings has not lived in the house for twelve years. It is now occupied by her son, Frank W. Jennings, and his family.
