

REAL "AMERICAN RANKS"

Mayor Bransford and Joe Lippman Haul Down the Flag of Truce.

DARMER'S HEAD IN DANGER

Chairman of the Campaign Committee Will be Politely but Firmly Asked to Resign.

With Joseph Lippman in the background pulling the wires, the "American" party campaign is being conducted in a distasteful manner to Mayor John S. Bransford, who leads their ticket for re-election. In fact, the breach is so wide between Bransford and the campaign committee that he has refused to do any business with it personally. A "Buddy" Fowler, private secretary to Mayor Bransford, so far has acted as a "go-between" and has carried on what business the mayor has had with the city campaign committee.

Under the direction of Joseph Lippman, whose shadow is always cast ahead of him, the campaign committee has been making the campaign pledges and will demand the positive officials if the ticket is elected.

Mayor Bransford declares he will fight the proposition. It is said, in the city before election day. J. E. Darmer, chairman of the campaign committee, who draws \$1,000 a month for conducting the campaign, will be asked to resign. Darmer is Lippman's man Friday, and consults with his chief before a move is made. Darmer declares he will not resign, it is said, and an effort will be made to oust him in some manner.

BEHIND THE SCENES.

For some time this row has been brewing over the saloon on west second south street where the "American" has headquarters. In the first place, Darmer was chosen as the campaign manager at the request of former Senator Thomas Kearns, who agreed to pay him \$1,000 a month to give up his law and handle the campaign exclusively. Darmer agreed, and accepted the position.

Lippman took up a labor with Darmer and pledged him to support him. Several others pledged themselves to Lippman, and with this as a basis he began to build up a machine, which would carry the convention, nominating him for mayor.

QUICK CHANGE ARTIST.

When this play was made, Kearns went to Darmer and threatened to stop his pay if he supported Lippman in the campaign. As a result, Darmer jumped into the machinery of the campaign, and became a candidate for mayor. Darmer stayed in the McMillan camp for a week or two, and then when Bransford entered the field as a candidate he went back to Lippman. In the meantime, Lippman had annexed Frank Christensen, secretary of the board of public works, of which McMillan is chairman, as his campaign manager. Christensen conducted Lippman's game for the nomination with the assistance of Darmer.

In the convention Mayor Bransford had the delegates and won easily, but Lippman had the city committee, and the "American" club under his thumb. When it came to naming the city campaign committee, Lippman had the last word in everything.

Darmer was chosen as chairman, Christensen as secretary and treasurer, and Philip T. Ayres, who is said to be a distant relative of Lippman, although he denies it, as assistant secretary. With his henchmen in the saddle, Lippman has built up around the "American" headquarters a machine which is running the campaign as he pleases.

STORY OF A CHECK.

This is what Mayor Bransford is unable to tell. He has not been at the "American" headquarters since he closed his own, the day after the convention. When the city campaign committee asked for contributions from the candidates, Mayor Bransford was held up for twice as much as the candidate for mayor ever was before. Mayor Bransford did not care about the amount of the check but it was the manner in which it was done.

When he paid the assessment with his check, he made it out in favor of A. "Buddy" Fowler. Fowler carried it to headquarters and forwarded it in the same manner Mayor Bransford is transmitting all his business with the city campaign committee.

Lippman is running up a deal where he is intended to control the appointment of the city engineer and some other appointive officers. Lippman is the attorney for Davis & Heuser, contractors for the North Temple street widening. They are losing money and the plans will have to be changed in order to save them from going into bankruptcy. It is stated, Lippman worked with Fowler for a month before he was forced to resign, to compel him to change the plans. This Fowler refused to do, and Lippman and Fowler have been enemies ever since.

In the course of a day or two, it is understood that Mayor Bransford is going to demand the resignation of Fowler and some others in order to break Lippman's power in the city campaign committee. Mayor Bransford declares that he will not stand by the promises made by Lippman. The situation which confronts Mayor Bransford is dispiriting, and he says that he will not submit to it.

Having secured funds for reconstruction, the company is building a new saw and planing mill, a complete saw mill, and a planing mill, all of which are now being completed. Charles Olsen, an employee of the Morris-Morris Lumber company, did not obey a holdup's command to throw up his hands, and the robber struck him a terrific blow with the butt of a revolver, landed him in the hospital, and robbed him of \$20, damaged him into the shadow of the Newhouse building, and left him in the darkness, at 2:30 o'clock this morning. Olsen was not able to furnish any description of the holdup when he recovered consciousness and staggered to the police station.

STILL NO HOLDUPS.

Although Policemen Saw Both Men. Their Escape Is Safe.

Although the employees at the Finch cafe immediately notified the police of the holdup which occurred at that place, at 11:30 o'clock, Tuesday morning, and in spite of the fact that Joseph Sands, head waiter, ran to the corner of Second South and Main streets and pointed out the two holdups to Patrolman J. A. Patterson as they ran out of Victoria alley on to Main street, the robbers have made their safe escape. The police arrested a dozen "ragged" "vags," but could connect none of them with the robbery. Patrolman Patterson was close enough to the fleeing holdups to shout at them to stop and he managed to fire one shot at the holdup who fled down Main street until he disappeared in the vicinity of the Newhouse building.

RILEY'S SLAYERS NOT CAUGHT.

After a Week Has Elapsed, Police Show Inability to Get Them.

Seven days have elapsed since Special Officer C. C. Riley was shot to death by a holdup whom he was talking to the police station. The crime was committed on State street, between First and Second streets, at the corner of the rear of the police station. The police have reported no trace of the murderer and his companion.

The fund for the relief of Officer Riley's widow and 6-month-old baby, who are pitifully destitute, has reached between \$300 and \$400. Ernest Humberger and Mrs. L. H. McCord, assisted Chief of Police Barlow and deputized with the department all of the subscriptions for Mrs. Riley's aid which had come into their hands.

A theatrical benefit had been repeatedly suggested by sympathizers of the young widow and her little baby, but the police department refused to back such a benefit on the ground that Riley was not a member of the Salt Lake force at the time of his death, but merely "special" temporarily in the employ of the city. The police department takes the attitude that if a benefit performance were given for Riley's widow and baby, the department would have difficulty in securing funds by similar benefits in the future should one of the members of the force meet with a like fate.

GOVERNMENT WILL TAKE WATERSHEDS

Agreement Between City and Forestry Department Round- ing Into Form.

EXPENSE TO BE DIVIDED.

Each Party to Proposed Arrangement Will Assume One-Half the Cost Of Supervision.

A plan to place the watershed furnishing Salt Lake City with its water supply in the hands of the government under the direction of the forestry department, has been practically agreed upon between representatives of the government and Salt Lake City. The matter was considered in Monday night's council meeting, and referred to the municipal laws committee, the city engineer and the city attorney, with the mayor associated, and those officers will go over the matter in all its details with the government officials, who will finally arrive at an agreement as to the care of the watershed.

It is proposed to place the mountain and valleys of City creek and Parley's canyon in the hands of the forestry department, so that the government will be responsible for the preservation of the water supply. The expense of maintaining the government supervision over the watershed will be divided between the government and the city. It is declared that this policy will be the best possible means of conserving the watershed and its natural supply of water in years to come.

The proposed agreement between the government and city closes the districts named to prospecting or mineral development, except upon agreement between the forester and the mayor. The revenue from permits to prospect or sale of timber is to be paid into the city treasury. The city is to pay a ranger or forest guard, under the direction of the forester, not less than \$900 in more than \$1,200 a year, and one-half the expense of tools and supplies for fighting forest fires on or between the watershed of Parley's canyon or City creek.

When ever planted on city lands, timber shall at once become the property of the city. The city is to pay for planting of trees on city lands and for transplants on city lands at the rate of \$1.75 per 1,000. The number of acres to be planted will be determined by the mayor and the forester.

A special agreement is included in connection with the agricultural land in Parley's canyon, of which the city owns 200 acres. On this land the forester is to plant not less than one acre more than five acres, to be selected by him in coniferous trees and held as a demonstration area. If successful, the city can have the entire tract of 200 acres planted for a forest. The city is to prevent trespass, and the forester will furnish the evidence against trespassers. The city must furnish labor, fencing, tools and materials, and give the forest officials the exclusive use of the land and buildings for nursery site and pasture, not exceeding 30 acres in area. The city is also asked to grant to the forestry officers a special police commission without pay in their duties on the reserve. The agreement between the city and the forestry department is to last 10 years.

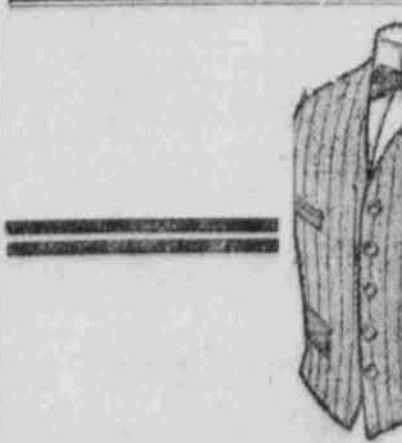
DAUGHTERS ELECT OFFICERS.

CATTLE MARKET IS A MARVEL TO BERESFORD

ENGLISH ADMIRAL VISITS KANSAS CITY STOCK YARDS.

Ingenuity and Rapidity of Buyers and Cleanliness of Surroundings a Surprise to British Naval Officer.

"I visited the greatest cattle market in the world today—our Kansas City stock yards," said Admiral Charles Beresford of the British navy, as he left the Hotel Baltimore last night. "I want to say that the reputation has been justly earned. Several thousand head of my cattle have been sold through the Kansas City yards, and I have been well satisfied with the results."

The market is the greatest in the world in more ways than one. My agents sold a bunch of Londoner all of cattle off my Welsh ranch here last week, and when I received an invitation Saturday to visit the yards and which the chief clerk, Mr. J. C. Lippman, eagerly accepted the invitation.

"I was told that there was a great deal of dirt about the yards, but I was agreeably surprised. In fact, I could not for the world see how the employees there managed to keep things so clean and neat."

The system of handling cattle as they are unloaded from the cars, penned, sold, weighed and started for the killing benches, is simply marvelous. I noticed particularly the convenience with which the employees there managed to keep things so clean and neat.

"At first glance the handling of the cattle from the cars to the pens or to the reloading pens seems to be in the nature of an unbroken line. It is hard to believe that no confusion results in the handling of these immense numbers of cattle daily."

WORK OF THE BUYERS.

The work probably of the buyers was most interesting to me. I watched several of them closely as they would examine a load of steers and strolling around among their pokes them in the ribs and in the loins with their heavy canes. In England the work of these men would be considered as positively marvelous. Of course over there we have much more machinery and labor here. The buyers there are heavier than the ordinary run here.

"I did not visit the packing houses here as I visited the big ones in Chicago, but I understand that they are all practically alike. There is a vast difference, however, in the appearance of the yards and the facilities with which the cattle are handled here has many advantages over the Chicago yards."

COMPETITION EXPLAINED.

"England and Europe get the most of the better grades of beef killed here," I understand, continued the admiral. "The reason for this is that the cattle packers here send out the best meat that they can secure. There is a big demand for the American meat and the American packer is supplying it."

Admiral Beresford, with his attorney, departed last evening for New York city. He has to be in England by October 21. He expressed great regret that he could not remain over to see the P. O. P. festivities, but declared that he was highly pleased with his visit to Kansas city and that he expected to make his next stay here much longer. (From the Kansas City Journal.)

WORKSHOP FOR BLIND IS NOW ESTABLISHED

Contributions Are Needed to Add to Those Already Donated.

Through the efforts of S. Jenkinson, president of the association for the blind, a workshop has been established in the city where the adult blind may gain practical training in some art or craft, by which they may be able to obtain independent livelihood. This is no way differs with the school in Ogden, with the auxiliary reading room, or any association, but is simply a headquarters where the blind may gather for training, study or entertainment, the chief purpose being its establishment as a workshop through the kindness of the first presidency. A large and comfortable room has been donated for this purpose, situated in the former lifting office building now vacated for the new structure in north Main street. Light and heat are also donated with the building, and through the solicitation of Mr. Jenkinson and many friends of the blind, several articles have been given for the furnishing of the room. The work shop is a room by the Dinsdale woolen company, chairs by the Greenwald company, etc. A generous gift contributed to the use of the training purposes of the institution is a grand piano given by the Clayton Daines Music company, to be used in the study of piano tuning, an art to which the blind are peculiarly adapted.

A singing school has also been organized, and the students are now practicing. A shoemaker's cobbling bench and outfit are also among the donations and have been provided for practice by the beginners in this trade. Many other things are needed, among them a typewriter and articles of furnishing which it is hoped may soon be donated by friends of the blind.

Each Thursday night, beginning tomorrow, an "at home" will be held for the adult blind at the room, where they can gather and listen to music, reading, and other entertainment, while those who desire may also be taught in knitting and crocheting work, etc., by Mrs. Dishes, who will be present on those evenings. As soon as the workshop is furnished and properly equipped, a housewarming will be held.
