Curcago, 6.-The Times special says Delegate Cannon stated, today, that he was confident of securing favorable action on the bill admitting Utah into the Union, which is now in the hands of the House Territorial Committee. He claims that it has a better right to admission than Colorado, which was let in as a semi-gambling poli-tical adventure. Inquiry develops probability that a strong opposition will be made to the bill. It is a scheme that promises to bring the entire Mormon question into prominence. Many members think the question will have to be settled one way or the other by Congress before Utah can become a State. Mormen hostility to Gentile settlers will prove the greatest stumbling block to the success of the bill.
