WASHINGTON, 9. - Thomas J. Brady makes an affidavit in which he recites a statement made in the affidavit of Bliss, in regard to his (deponent) picking up the envelop with money in it from S. W. Dorsey, and says that the statement is wholly and utterly untrue so far as it refers to deponent, who never met George E. Spencer in the room of Stephen W. Dorsey. Deponent further says that if George E. Spencer ever made such a statement as is indicated in the affidavits of Bliss, he stated what was wholly and absolutely untrue.

The following order will be observed in closing the Star route cases: Kerr to open for the Government. He will be followed by two for the defense. Bliss will then deliver his address, to which the defense will be allowed three replies. The Secretary of the Navy approved the design of the flag to be known as the President's flag. It will fly from the main mast of every vessel used by the President. The first one to be used will fly from the steamer Dispatch, when the President leaves on that vessel for New York.

The President who has \$100,000 for the suppression of epidemics has referred the matter of yellow fever to the Secretary of the Treasury.

A United States officer at Colon reports that the population of 6,000 are dying at the rate of 100 a month. The natives as well as the unaclimated are attacked by the fever. Of a total of 650 Chilian soldiers in the garison at Chedayo, Peru, 300 have died from yellow fever.

Matamoras, 8.—There were fifteen deaths on Sunday and twelve on Monday up to 3 p.m.

Brownsville, 0 .- No deaths since last report. The troops at Fort Browning are preparing to leave.

Boston, 9 .- The brig Gold Finder from Hayti, and the Stacey Clark, from Havana, are detained at quarantine. Each had a fatal case of yellow fever during the voyage.

Brownsville, 9 .- There are fifty cases of yellow fever here, and the epidemic is developing. People are preparing for the worst.

The Department of State is in receipt of advices from the Consul at Tanner Liege, Belgium, showing tion. that the crops of England and Belgium have suffered severely through the protracted wet weather. The farmers of Belgium only hope at best to secure half of a yield of the wheat crop. The market gardens sustained heavy damage, and Irish potatoes are taken out of the soil so wet they commence to rot a week after they are gathered. Large importations must necessarily follow, and American farmers are strongly urged to devise a means of placing their Irish potatoes in the markets of Brussels and Antwerp the coming winter. Lathrop; for auditor, Jonathan Buck, and for attorney general, J. Fairchild. The usual prohibitory resolutions were adopted, also congratulations to Kansas and Iowa, where victory has been scored.

> Topeka, Kansas, 8.—At the republican State convention preliminary caucus to night it was ascertained that St. John will go into the convention with 272 votes. The caucus to-morrow morning will prepare a strong prohibition platform, recommending that Congress give its at tention to the question of prohibition at its next session.

Indianapolis, 9 .- The republican State convention elected R. W. Thompson chairman. A platform was then adopted which recalls the services of the republican party; their liberal pension laws, their fi nancial success, its services to labor, capital and aliens. It demands that the pending constitutional amendments be submitted by the next legislature to the vote of the people; that they are not partisan amendments and there should be a special election for them, A warm tribute is paid to Lincoln and Garfield. The platform also demands a greatly reduced revenue; sympathy is expressed and a hope that home rule will prove successful. It holds that Congress should adopt laws for a radical civil service reform by which subordinate positions should no longer be rewards for party zeal; patronage must be abolished and efficiency and fidelity in the public servants must be increased. The industry, wisdom and firmness of President Arthur meets the cordial endorsement of the Indiana republicans. Other resolutions are generally local in their scope.
