AERIAL TRAMWAY WRECKED

Serious Loss to Silver King-Robert Henderson Dead.

Park City, Summit Co., Dec. 12 .- By the breaking loose of a bucket of ore on the revolving cable at tower No. 13 the Silver King aerial tramway was badly wrecked late yesterday afternoon The wreck continued down the line to tower No. 29, scattering buckets along the way. Most of the buckets are bad-ly damaged from the impact of their ollisions on the steep descent, which was augmented by the load of ore each contained while the buckets alone weigh 600 pounds. Several of the towers are twisted and jarred from the true and the revolving cable trails the ground from 13 to 25.
