## A MEMORABLE RIDE.

**John White Claims Heavy Damages** from the Union Pacific Railroad Company.

Shortly before noon Judge Zane and a jury were called upon to try the damage suit brought by one John White against the Union Pacific Railroad company in which the plaintiff seeks to recover \$10,000. This is the second trial of the case, the facts in which have already appeared elsewhere in this paper. It appears that the plaintiff is a man of 70 years, who, it is said, has been on one of the company's freight cars in the state of Wyoming, sometime in the year 1889, when it is alleged he was discovered about daybreak by one of his men in charge of the car, and very severely beaten. He was immediately taken, according to his own story, forced on to the car, a rope placed around his neck, he was thrown overboard, and dragged along in that way for some distance. Some time later he was released, having been fired at by one of the company's employees.

**SHADE TREES TO BE CUT DOWN.**

The City Engineer Reports the Estimated Cost of the West Side Water-  
age System at \$90,000.

There was a regular session of the City Council last night. The members present were Hulse, Follett, Hardy, Moran, Kelly, Helm, Washburn, Lovewell, Dimon, Bell, Horn, Kirkland, Evans. President Lovegood presided over the chair.

## THE PROCESSION.

Sanger & Lewis asked for the privilege of conducting a "Home Show" Pioneer square at \$30 per day on May 24th and 25th. Committee on public grounds with power to act.

J. C. Cutler asked for watermain extension to West Temple, the street south of North South street. Committee on waterworks.

D. P. Tarpay and others asked for an electric light at the intersection of Seventeenth and Eleventh Main Street. Committee on improvements.

John Napper and others asked that their sidewalks on east South Temple street be accepted in lieu of special tax. Board of public works.

Isabella McEwan asked for a rebate of employment license. Committee on license.

The Rio Grande Western announced the appointment of a bagman at Second, Sixth and Sixth West, and Third Street and Sixth West. Filed.

George A. Harmon and others asked that their sidewalk on east South Temple street be accepted in lieu of the special tax imposed on the street. Committee on improvements.

William Nayor asked permission to pile building material in front of his place on Main street. Granted.

Kelley & Gilligan asked for permission to a petition setting forth Eighth East street to be opened south of Ninth South street. Committee on streets.

D. A. Lawrence asked for release from his tax in Highland Park, Addition City. Answered.

E. W. Taylor and others asked that half of South Street be cut down to regular grade between Ninth and East Streets. Committee on streets.

H. Thompson and others asked permission to dump refuse on certain lots in block 23 in Aerial. Stanley committee with power to act.

M. Hayes and others asked permission to lay their own sidewalks on the north side of the West House on Second South street. Committee on streets.

The Jennings Investment company and 30 others asked for speedy improvement of First South street, west of East Temple street, laid on the table temporarily.

The Fifteenth Ward eccllesiastical association asked for relief from certain lands for taxes.

Thomas A. Pinchin asked privileges to lay a sidewalk in front of his home for forty days "free gratis." Denied.

Mr. M. G. Clawson et al asked that the Metropolitan State Company be allowed to construct a sidewalk on the south side of West Temple, between Second and Fourth East, board of public works.

P. T. Nyström stated that he was about to put in a flagging walk in front of his premises on the corner of Commercial and First South streets, and the council recommended that it be put in a similar walk at the intersection.

B. A. Duke petitioned for a lease of the city grave yard. Committee on public grounds.

C. G. Smith et al asked that an irrigation ditch be constructed on Second West Temple street from the intersection of First South street to Ninth South street. Referred to committee on irrigation and watermain, with power to act.

A. L. Moore and others asked that the furnishing of labor and material used in macadamizing streets be awarded to the lowest bidder. Committee on streets.

The county court petitioned for the appropriation of \$60,000 to the county engineer for paving of Main and West street. Committee on claims.

I. T. Burton asked for permission to pile lumber in front of 1017 West First South street for a period of three days. Committee on streets with power to act.

Dana French et al asked for permission to use a portion of First South street for the purpose of loading grain. Committee on public grounds.

F. A. Sanderson et al asked that the Metrop. State company be permitted to lay sidewalks on their main store of South Temple street. Granted.

A similar request was made with reference to First South street, between Eighth and Twelfth East, given to the same committee.

R. F. Newell et al asked for watermain extension in Ingleside subdivision. Committee on waterworks.

The Metropolitan State company asked for the awarding of sidewalk contracts on Main and Second South and Second South streets. Postponed for thirty days in order that they might bid on, in accordance with other petitions before the Council, the right to award the contracts to the lowest bidder for Utah state instead of imported cement.

E. W. Cleveland asked to be appointed a policeman. Committee on police.

W. C. Perkins and others asked that retainers be well compensated on Center Committee.
