LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRICAL.—"After Dark" was well received on Saturday night, and was certainly one of the most dramatic of the season ever produced here. Some of the characters were very well rendered. The Norwegian performance of Mr. and Mrs. Monson gave great satisfaction, although but few of the audience understood the language they spoke, yet all could see by the facial expressions, and the gestures and general style of the lady and gentleman, that they understood their own and the audience's feelings. The performance will conclude with the farce of "Mother and Child are doing well."

STOCK MEETING.—Remember the meeting of the Society for the Cultivation and Improvement of Stock, to be held in the City Hall, at 7 o'clock this evening.
