To Secure Them W. H. Murray is Now on His Way East.

RESOURCES OF THE STATE.

In the Past Few Years It Has Made Wonderful Progress in All Directions—Men Are Now Needed.

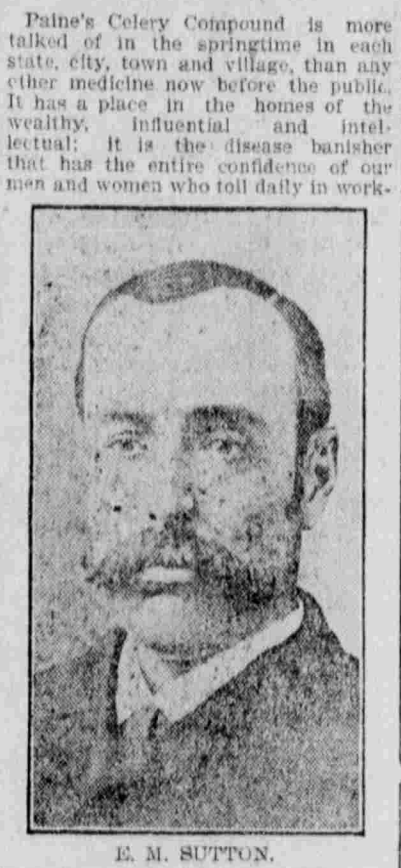
W. H. Murray, representing the California Promotion committee of San Francisco, is in the city on his way east for the purpose of advertising the resources and promoting the settlement and development of the Golden state. The gentleman says the state has great need for workers and offers in support of the statement the fact that California is no longer composed only of cattle ranches, sheep pastures, great grain fields, mines and lumbering camps, but that these features, particularly from the new point of view, are overdeveloped in importance by vast areas of fertile, level, and 150-acre tracts, vineyards, small fruit farms, vegetable fields, dairies, hop fields, sugar-beet fields, oil districts and varied industries requiring a great deal of intelligent manual labor. In the past few years from five to 100 acres producing fruits, cattle, hogs, sheep, alfalfa, grain, potatoes, poultry, and small fruits, are becoming more numerous throughout the state, and in this condition it is desired to promote the use of one-pound cartons. These changes require an immense amount of additional skilled labor in the canneries and in the cured fruit packing houses.

ONE WAY TO STOP LELICH.

Methodists Will Cut Off His Salary—Not a Parselless and Scrupulous Man.

With Rev. Lelich still in the superintendency saddle of the Utah Methodist mission the church is a house divided against itself. The superintendent who saw fit to ignore the request of Bishop Warren that he resign, it appears, is backed by Rev. E. E. Mark, presiding elder of the Scandinavian mission, and Rev. J. C. Bickel of the First church, and possibly one or two other churches out in the state are with him. But the great bulk of the Methodists in Utah have a razor in their stocking for the superintendent, militant, and propose to cut it out of his salary supply. Then, if the small faction, who are backing him see fit to make up that deficiency, they are at liberty to do so. Both the Liberty Park and First Methodist churches have openly declared war on Lelich, and both churches have voted unanimously to contribute no further to his support. Great surprise is expressed that with all this racket going on, none of the bishops of the church make any sign, and seem willing to see their church in Utah on the verge of disruption rather than infringe on ecclesiastical courtesy, and interfere with Bishop Fowler's appointee.
